# We need to tell our stories...

### Dear Friends

As I write this, I am looking out of the window of my office on a clear blue sky. The question is, why am I sat in my office writing this letter to you all, when I could be outside enjoying the sunshine? Of course, I have great faith that there will still be sunshine on a day I have less work to do, should that day ever come. I say this to prove just how great my faith and trust is. It's an extremely good job that God is hugely more reliable and trustworthy than the weather in Northampton. I hope that you, unlike me, have managed to enjoy and make the absolute most of the beautiful weather we've had recently.

Being thankful is something that we're constantly invited to be in Scripture. Sometimes it feels like something especially good or noteworthy has to happen before I am reminded to be thankful. I think that this is unfortunate. So much happens every day that, if we have our perspectives right and our hope in Jesus, can cause us to be thankful. When was the last time you said 'thank you' to God for something?

Recently it's been great that in some of our services, people have

shared stories, testimonies in Church language, of things that God has done in them, through them and for them. I love hearing stories of God. It really builds my faith! Sometimes I'm feeling really good and some-

times not, but whenever I hear a story of God showing how good, kind and generous he is, it always makes my day better. Even on the days when I hear a great story about someone else's experience and I'm actually in a place of waiting or disappointment myself, it can still be an encouragement. Especially then, really. God does not leave us to go through life thrashing around wildly, not knowing what to do, how to live for him. How to love people and ourselves. God lives in us, walks with us every day, if we have invited him to.

We have the Bible to read, study and learn from. We have prayer, in which we can ask for things, but which, the longer I go through life, seems to be a lot more worthwhile if I go in to it with an attitude of worship and listening, rather than beginning with my ever-lengthening list of wishes and desires, however keenly-felt and necessary they seem. And we also have each other. We shouldn't underestimate how important it is to journey through life with a Church family. It truly is a wonderful thing. When life is great, it is good to rejoice together. When it is horrible, as it can so often be, we weep together with those who are weeping. It is an enormous privilege.

Why am I waffling on so? I know I usually do, so why change the habit of a lifetime? I think one of the things God is inviting us to

do in this season of Spirit-Filled Church and beyond, is to be confident and content with him, to the extent that we tell our stories of faith. Not just to each other, either, but to tell stories of faith in normal conversation, in the same way that we might tell an anecdote about what was on television last night, or a story we read in the paper, or a video we watched on Facebook.

Often, I can't wait to share a funny story or a memory with people I meet. Are we like that about our faith? Some people think faith is private. It's like politics, best not discussed in a public forum, for some. Imagine what would have happened if Jesus had decided to keep his calling from God private and live a life full of words and faithful worship but no action, or if the disciples, having experienced all they did, kept it to themselves? It's a challenge for some of us, me included I think.

I'm always ready to talk about football ....

So, I want to encourage us all to talk. Talk about God. Talk about those times when you prayed and then saw something in the situation you were praying for change. Talk about the time you stopped talking, listened to someone, asked them how they were

"Imagine what would have happened if the disciples, having experienced all they did, kept it to themselves?" doing and heard them unfold a story you'd never heard before. We're going to seek creative ways to make space in our services on Sundays for these stories over the coming weeks and months.

That's what happened to some of us when we learnt more about being a Missional Church with John McGinley from Holy Trinity Leicester recently. John encouraged us to pray for people we're regularly in contact with who don't yet know Jesus, that they would get to know him. He encouraged us to make a practice of encouraging one another to do this in our House Groups. Actually to ask one another how the people we're praying for are doing from one week or meeting to the next. It might sound daunting, but it also sounds like a great thing to commit to.

Our Church is a fun and vibrant place to be and to belong. Wouldn't it be great if more people found Jesus and a place to belong, with us? God's call to us is to pray...and then to see what he does...to be thankful and then to worship him, to put him first, to focus on him with all we have.

I've enjoyed the beginning of 'Spirit-Filled Church' over the last weeks. It will be exciting to see how this develops over the coming weeks. Do join us on June 23<sup>rd</sup> as we enjoy a Holy Spirit Renewal day with Gordon Dey.

## 2018 AGM Report

It has been a wonderful, hard, God-filled, challenging and exciting year in the life of Emmanuel Group of Churches. The reports we're collecting together to form what we're offering to you today as a representation of the last 12 months in our Churches will, I hope, give a full picture of just how alive and vital things here are. There's a risk that a report like this might come across as dry, stating fact or opinion after fact or opinion. There's also the temptation to make an endless list, simply to ensure that nothing is missed out and no feels are inadvertently hurt. On this occasion, I hope to fall into neither of those traps. Instead I want to spend a few hundred words picking out what I think have been some of the key aspects of our year. I'll probably be repeating what's said elsewhere, but emphasising important elements of the life of a family more than once doesn't hurt, does it.

As we're meeting together for our AGM on April 29<sup>th</sup>, I will be just over a week short of having been one year in the role of Team Rector here. The transition from Assistant Curate to this new role has been made smooth by the support and hard work of a lot of people. I want to pay particular tribute to Linda Withers, Mike Maddocks, Nick Bewleoy-Tippler, John Weaver, Keith Holland-Delamere, Maureen Timms, Kris Hatherly David Bell and the whole Preachers and Leaders team in particular. So much of what happens in the life of our Churches relies on one or more of these fine people. And most of what they do is unseen, too. I'm grateful for you all. I'm also grateful, incredibly so, to have Phil Snelson as my friend and colleague. Our year has been filled with joys and sorrows. It's great to work alongside each other. I am looking forward to seeing Phil's return to health continue in the coming months. It's also been great to have Doug Spenceley join us this year as Assistant Priest and to have the skill and experience of Revd Chris Pearson as part of our family too. Thank you all.

A paragraph about me is probably one too many for a report like this. I thought it a useful start though to illustrate that I was licensed on May 8<sup>th</sup> 2017. So much has happened, changed and developed since then. Here are a few highlights from my point of view:

Prepare the Way and Jesus-Shaped People

have fixed our eyes and our focus on Jesus over the last year. We are a family because of our welcome into God and his life in us. It is wonderful to see so many people wanting to get to know Jesus more deeply and follow his way. The five months we spent on JSP have been a real highlight for me. I look forward to reporting on Spirit-Filled Church next year.

We have continued to be outward-looking in a whole host of ways. We have led assemblies or lessons in 9 schools in the Parish over the last year and have recently begun monthly services in two local Care Homes. We continue to see the community highly valuing the work of Foodbank, as well as the recent addition of the FISH school holiday meals programme. Foodbank usage in our town has grown exponentially in the last year. Our teams of volunteers, who come from a huge variety of Churches and community backgrounds, are working wonderfully and providing a crucial service. More than this, we are showing the love of God in a tangible way and, when the time is right, having plenty of opportunity to talk about it too.

It has been wonderful to see the recent flourishing of the Coffee Shop, another critical element of our mission. Please do continue to pray for all the staff, volunteers and customers.

We've had baptisms, christenings, confirmations, licensings to new ministry (Maueen Luke, Nick Bewley-Tippler, Angie Kennedy and Doug Spenceley in the last year). We've had visits from Baptist Regional Ministers, Methodist Superintendents, CofE Bishops, an Archdeacon and many more besides. Our worshipping life continues to be diverse and complimentary.

So much great work goes on with children and young people. Truly, talk to Mell and Tracy and their teams. You'd be delighted to know just how much goes on. Messy Church continues to draw huge numbers towards God and Church, R-Zone, Jamout and God Squad are flourishing, as well as leading to trips and experiences of God for huge numbers of young people.

Mike, Grant and the Finance Team, together with support from Paul Adams the Diocesan Stewardship Officer, have helped us steer a prudent and ultimately successful course through choppy financial waters over the last year. They would not be able to do so without the help of God, and the incredible generosity you show as members of our Churches. I continue to be astonished by just how *giving* you are. Thank you.

We have had many safeguarding challenges over the last year. Whilst this in itself is certainly not a highlight (we could definitely do without them) we have developed our Safeguarding policy and practice to such an extent that the Diocesan Safeguarding Officer for Peterborough Diocese uses us as an example of best-practice. This is a tribute to Kris Hatherly and those who have assisted her in her work as our Safeguarding Officer. She works incredibly hard and Phil and I are truly grateful for her.

Our building has gone through remarkable changes over the last 12 months. We have new signs, we've had the Sports Hall decorated and anew floor laid, the Lift-Housing Roof has been repaired, the Coffee Shop redecorated and, next week, the Sports Hall Roof will be beginning its own renovation. A lot of this has been made possible through donations from the congregation as well as generous donations from the Methodist Circuit and a Diocesan Loan. It should not be forgotten though that a lot of money has come in from members of the community who would not see themselves as Church Members, or even Christians in many cases, but who see the value of what we are doing in serving Northampton East. Particular thanks are due to Weston Favell Shopping Centre for their decoration of the hall and for continuing to serve us so marvellously in a whole variety of ways, great and small.

I could go on. So much happens in the life of our Churches. You could fill a very long book about it all. What I think sums us up is that I have been told more than once recently by those who lead denominations regionally that 'Emmanuel punches above its weight.' I think we are doing the right thing. We are doing our best, guided by the Spirit and seeking to give the Spirit plenty of space to move, and direct us. It is an enormous joy and privilege to be Team Rector of these Churches. Here's to the next 12 months.



## WAYS TO BOOST YOURGIVING.

### without it costing you a penny!

### If you pay income tax

Sign a GIFT AID FORM and use weekly or monthly envelopes (or bank standing orders). We can claim back the tax HMRC has deducted from your income before you get it, so we claim back an extra 25p for every £1 you donate each week or month.

### If you don't pay income tax

and use monthly envelopes or banker's order for regular giving, consider using Weekly envelopes instead. The government gives a 25% (ie¼) top up to Charities for <u>small cash donations (£20 or less)</u> subject to certain limits. **NB** - This is applicable to all such donations whether in loose cash or envelopes, but of course envelopes encourage regular giving. Therefore, If you normally give say a) £40 or b) £50 using Emmanuel monthly envelopes or bankers order, instead give £10 each week using weekly envelopes and in a four Sunday month your boosted giving would be (£40 +25% of £40) =£50.00. In a five Sunday month your boosted giving would be: (£50 +25% of £50) = £62.50


