Dear friends,

Recently I was visiting Northampton Town's training session in my role as chaplain. Anyone who has ever been to Moulton College knows that it is pretty windy up there. On this particular day, the wind buffeted me around a fair bit. At one point, as I was quietly watching on as the players trained, a sudden gust of wind caused me to do a wheelie and my wheelchair almost tipped over. If I'd been standing up, I'd be saying that I was almost blown off my feet. I'm not sure what the equivalent is when one is sitting down. I felt as if rebuking the wind was in order, but for some reason it didn't listen to me. Instead I held firm and was not blown over. Result.

In the course of my role I have the great joy of meeting a huge number of people who go through an incredible amount, but are not blown over by any of it. Whether it be things that happen which cause us to doubt or question our faith (a process which can be healthy at times, in my opinion) or which bring about changes in our situation or circumstances, the most important

thing any of us can choose to do individually is to place our trust in Jesus. It is Him who has the life, hope, security that we need. It's Him who set us the example for storm-calming, for persisting, walking on step by step, day by day, in the power of the Spirit and for God's glory.

That's what life is really about: keeping going, faithfully and not being tossed to and fro, whether it be by confusion about what we believe, like the Church at Ephesus which Paul wrote to was, or which direction to move in, which it seems to me Paul often was too, until the Spirit intervened (or more correctly he paid attention to the Spirit) and followed God's prompting.

Why start with this this month? Well, for one thing, I thought the idea of me flailing about trying not to be blown over might raise a chuckle, or at least a smirk. For another, it can seem to us that we are the only ones who are finding the wind a bit difficult to contend with at any given moment, but I can say with almost complete certainty that if we shared our joys and our doubts with each other, we'd find that a lot of us feel pretty similarly. There's no substitute for talking to one another.

There's also no substitute for prayer.

We do a lot of 'stuff' in our Group of Churches. Much of it is wonderful and makes a positive difference to the places we live in and God has given us, to love. This is exciting and should be celebrated. But the 'stuff' has to be begun, backed up and followed up by prayer.

All of us have a part to play in that, whether we are a person who is often at events or services or someone who can't do much of what might be considered front-line action.

Prayer is front-line action in the kingdom of God. It's hard

for us to say we have a relationship with God and not prioritise listening to and speaking to Him. Most other relationships don't work well if no one is listening or only one party is speaking. I know a lot of you pray, a lot, but please keep going. Make it a priority in your day. Find ways of remembering what you prayed for yesterday or last week, perhaps by keeping a prayer diary or similar, and then

go back and check: how did God answer that prayer? Was it a yes, a no or a not yet? And where there's been an answer you can see, say thank you. It's the polite thing to do.

We've had a great end to the summer, with FISH going well over the summer holidays, Paul Foster starting his training as a Licensed Pastoral Minister, Peter and Sheila Angus and Ken Clark joining us as members of the ministry team, new schools opening their doors to us for the first time as well as schools we worked with last year welcoming us in once again, Jo Alderman becoming the new co-ordinator of Foodbank (an answer to prayer there, for certain!) new people coming in to all of our congregations, the young people having a fantastic time at Soul Survivor, a wonderful evening with Paul Harcourt (National Director of New Wine) teaching us about taking every-day risks with Jesus and much more besides.

This is just the stuff that I can remember at 7pm on a Thursday. We have a huge amount to celebrate. There will be things I've not mentioned in this quick list that you might think are of crucial, central importance and can't believe I've left them out. Emmanuel is that kind of Group of Churches. It's a vibrant place bursting with life, and all of it is centred on God. It is for Him that we exist and do all the things we do. (continued on page 2)

Arriving at Emmanuel by Kay & Ken Clark

Kay writes: "As part of his training as a Lay Reader in the Church of England, Ken had to spend time at a church completely different to our own (St Giles, Northampton) regarding it's style of worship, the social make up of its congregation, emphasis of ministry etc. We were quite excited as we had previously met Haydon and found his vision for Community ministry to be exciting and appealing.

Oddly enough in our years of being involved in various ministries in churches we had never really been involved in a church that was so rooted in its community as Emmanuel. It is quite unusual and it was one of it's attractions for us".

"We were welcomed warmly and soon felt very much at home, in particular we found a place working with the Foodbank and more latterly volunteering with FISH where we felt we could make a contribution; serve and show God's love; often to people in great need.

Over the few months we have been here we have also become aware that throughout our Christian lives, although we have been involved in various ministries it has always been the call to serve the poor, the marginalised, those that are on the fringes of society and often the church, that has always gripped us".

Ken continues: "We have been very blessed by the commitment of those that volunteer here, often over many years, it is really quite humbling and they have set a faithful example for us to seek and follow."

"The Bible has much to say about concern for the poor, the mar-

ginalised and those that are disfranchised or 'different' in any way. There are over 3,000 verses that address these issues in the bible and I have a bible at home called 'The Poverty and Justice' bible which highlights in stark orange these scriptures.

Christian activist and speaker Jim Wallis whilst a member of the 'Sojourners' community in Washington DC speaks of the time they cut out of an old bible all the verses relating to these issues and were left with a very thin bible indeed. Caring for those in need has to be very high up on the agenda of God's people, as it is obviously the heart of God."

"As Christians we have to be careful though, there is often a tendency, although it may be unconscious, to be quite patronising towards those who have certain needs, we have to be careful not to come over as judgemental or have an attitude of 'let us make you like us'.

We have to serve on a level playing field and even though some have been more fortunate or made a better fist of life, God's unconditional love is the same towards us all and we have to show that towards those who have not fared as well on life's playing field. We have been so encouraged by what we have found here at Emmanuel where everyone is regarded as of equal value and respect.

In conclusion Kay says: "Thank you for receiving us and accepting us so warmly and we look forward to working with you as we seek to build God's kingdom together here at Emmanuel, Boothville and Rectory Farm."

To get them through the darkest days, Tearfund's partners provided Areej with emergency aid packages. But this was just the start.



This mix of material and emotional support is laying the foundation for the healing of a generation of people devastated by conflict.





What does the UK Church look like in 2018?

The church is both declining and growing! There are 270 different denominations in the UK, 95 of which exist in Scotland. For simplicity these are put into 10 groups, the three largest of which are the Anglicans, Catholics and Presbyterians. Between them, these three Churches account for one fifth, 20%, of all the denominations. But sadly, three-fifths, or 60%, of all the members, and of all three Churches, are declining.

Two smaller groups, the Baptists and the Methodists are also declining. Together, they represent 4% of the denominations and 7% of the members.

That leaves five groups: the Independent Churches (such as FIEC and the Brethren), New Churches (such as Vineyard and Newfrontiers), Orthodox, Pentecostals and the Smaller Denominations (such as the Salvation Army, Quakers, Seventh-Day Adventists, all the many immigrant churches, and so on).

Each of these five groups is *growing* in membership terms. They account for 76% of the UK's denominations but only 33% of church members. Unfortunately, the decline by the larger denominations is too great to be offset by the growth.

The faster growing denominations fall into roughly three equal groups:

- 1) Immigrant churches (especially Poles, Romanians, and Filipinos and Koreans in England and Chinese in Scotland). Most of the Poles are Roman Catholic; many of the Romanians are Orthodox, but the others are mostly Evangelical.
- 2) The Pentecostal churches, which are mostly Black, although welcoming all nationalities. The largest of these is the Redeemed Christian Church of God [RCCG] (planting 800 churches in the UK in the last 20 years). The RCCG uses a mantra straight out of Nigerian bush country, "Plant a church within 10 minutes walking distance" (of where people live), which is equivalent to about a ½ mile circle.
- 3) Other growing denominations include Hillsong, Churches of Christ, the FIEC, Vineyard, and Messy Church. These churches are planted where there is a need or an opportunity.

And they say it's old fashioned

The children were amazed and one said, "This is fantastic; someone should have invented this a long time ago!"






