Dear Friends,

As I meet people in all kinds of situations, services, meetings, Bible studies and other groups as well as individually, I find that if the conversation gets round to prayer. A lot of people say they find prayer difficult or lack confidence. We all know that it is supposed to be important and then we feel a bit guilty that we don't pray more often or are "not very good at it". I'll let you into a secret (probably not a very well kept one) – ministers find prayer difficult sometimes too!

The good news is that God knows this and even Paul the apostle. Paul tells us 'the Holy Spirit helps us in our weakness. For example, we don't know what God wants us to pray for. But the Holy Spirit prays for us with 'groanings that cannot be expressed in words'. (Romans 8:26)


So why pray?!There are lots of reasons why it is good to pray, but I'm going to look briefly at just two: "relationship" and "releasing".

It seems to me that every relationship is based on something shared and therefore requires some kind of communication to actually be a relationship. Our relationship with God is most important of all and it is just the same. We need to communicate with God, talking with Him and listening too, so that our relationship with Jesus grows.

God has shared the lead in running His world with us (Genesis 1:28) and often He is waiting for us to release Him, or we could say "invite" Him, to come into a situation and help. Because we are designed to live by faith and love, in God's likeness, he doesn't force himself on us but waits for us to be open and let Him in. Even then of course He will do what is best and what is His will, not necessarily what we're asking for or telling Him what we think would be best. In Ephesians 3:20, Paul encourages us that God is 'able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine'. We can trust God to do at least the good we're thinking, and usually a whole lot more! God changes situations and he changes us through our praying.

The other thing I would like to touch on briefly is to encourage you to find ways that work for you. Maybe you already do this, but I find it really helpful to pray out loud (quietly usually and a good reason to be on your own!). It helps me to concentrate and stay focussed. It's also good practice for later when you're at prayer with others and find you want to share a few words.

A while back Margaret produced this idea of a wheel of prayer for a church prayer chain. We were doing a 24/7 prayer from Friday to Sunday, covering 24 hours of continuous prayer by different people taking an hour each at a time.



You spend just 5 minutes on each of the topics. Starting with "Worship, Thanks"... it is amazing how quickly an hour goes by even when you're awake in the middle of the night!

You could even try starting with just 1 or 2 minutes on each, and you could make the segments things that suit what you want to pray over. We all need the "worship", "thanks", "confession" and "listen", and it is important to pray for your church and its leaders. Why not give it a try, I wonder what your other segments might be?

For the Autumn, starting in September right through to the beginning of Advent, we're making prayer our main focus at services and in house-groups. As part of that we'll be taking a closer look at Jesus teaching on prayer through the pattern he gave his disciples that we call "The Lord's Prayer". I'm really looking forward to it – I hope you will too... now you know!

I hope these encouragements are of help to you. Prayer is like breathing to our soul, it is vital. Don't be discouraged with prayer; remember to ask God for the help of his Spirit with your prayers and find a way that works for you to grow your relationship with Jesus.

I hope you have a good summer and, even if things don't turn out the way you hoped, that you know the assurance of God with you.

# The Bible that was thrown away

The story is told by Brother Andrew, who worked for many years with the Persecuted Church, of a Christian pastor who was travelling some years ago on a train in the old Soviet Union.

There was just one other passenger in the railway car, and soon the two men were chatting. The subject of religion came up, and the other man extolled the logic of atheism and criticised religious belief. Then the Christian bravely expressed his own views, and even took out his Bible to show the man some relevant verses. But the atheist was both unmoved and annoyed.

As the futility of their argument became clear, the men lapsed into silence. When a little later the Christian was nearing his stop, he left the compartment for a few moments to get his suitcase. He returned to find his Bible was missing. The atheist was just closing the train window and sneered at him. It was clear that he had thrown the Bible out. The journey continued the final few miles in stony silence.

A few months later, a stranger came to call upon the Christian pastor in his village. It was a man from a

neighbouring village who asked to be baptised. The pastor was astonished and asked him what he knew about such things. The stranger told him this story:

"Until a few months ago I knew nothing of Christianity I am just a local builder, working on a site near the railway track. Then suddenly one afternoon a book came flying out of the window of a passing train and landed in the dust nearby. I walked over and picked it up. It was a Bible – the first I had ever seen.

"So I took it home and out of curiosity began to read it.
I was amazed by what I read, and I have become a
Christian. Now I want to be baptised and meet with other
Christian. I have heard rumours that you are also a
Christian, so I hoped that you would help me."

The astonished Christian pastor did indeed baptise the builder, and also confided his side of the story of the flying Bible. Within a few years the builder had converted several of his neighbours, and a tiny Christian church had been planted within his own community.

All because of a thrown-away Bible.

### "I will never fail you. I will never abandon you."(Hebrews 3.5)

Do you know the legend of the Cherokee Indian youth's rite of passage? His dad takes him into the forest blindfolded and leaves him alone. He is required to sit on a stump the whole night and not take off the blindfold until the ray of sun shines through it. He is all by himself. He cannot cry out for help to anyone. Once he survives the night, he is a man. He cannot tell the other boys of this experience. Each lad must come into his own manhood. The boy in our story was, naturally, terrified. He could hear all kinds of noise. Beasts were all around him. Maybe even a human would hurt him. The wind blew the grass and earth and it shook his stump. But he sat stoically, never removing the blindfold. It would be the only way he could be a man. Finally, after a horrific night the sun appeared and he removed his blindfold. It was then that he saw his father sitting on the stump next to him - at watch the entire night.

### **A Marathon Walk**

Way back in October 2018 I signed up with a group of ladies to "Walk the Walk" called the Moonwalk, a 26.2 mile walk through London at night, wearing a highly decorated bra.

The Moonwalk raises money for breast cancer research and community grants for smaller charities who provide practical support for those going through treatment and post treatment.

Six of the 13 that had signed up trained on a regular basis, and when walking we talked. I have personally struggled with grief over the last year, and by walking I talked, and the more I talked, the more it helped me get to grips with grief.

By listening to others in the group, I realised that each person had experienced a loss that had had a significant emotional impact on their lives. Whether it was a recent loss or a long time back, and we had all had days which were a struggle to get through. I didn't know when I signed up for the walk, that it would be on the weekend of the first anniversary of Andrews death. If I had known I probably would not have signed up.

# Baptism and Fundraising Activities

### **Baptism**

Rectory Farm welcomed the family of Zenerah to be Baptised into the Christian faith. We were blessed with a total of 87 people at the service, and a testimony of thanks from one of the visiting family that is worth repeating. Haydon asked for an open time of thanks to



God, and a lady stood up to give thanks to God for saving her husbands life.

A few weeks earlier, her husband had a heart attack in a car park. CPR was started and a paramedic crew attended. As the lady was praying, and the paramedics were working, a woman came beside her to hold her hand, and said she would pray with her. The woman stayed until her husband was in the ambulance and then walked off in a different direction from whence she came.

Once in the hospital the medical consultant, said that whoever had carried out the CPR had saved her husbands life. This lady knew that the woman who had joined with her in Prayer was an angel of the Lord.

Praise be to God.

However I was glad I did walk as otherwise I  $\,$  probably would have stayed in bed and not gone out -

Thankfully I was with a group of ladies who joined together to make a difference

through blisters, chafing, and aching legs,
through encouragement & support
through compeed blisters and jelly babies
through tears and laughter

My faith in God was strengthened, over the months, by learning that if we share each others stories, we realise that we are not alone. That emotions can be raw, after 1 year or 10, however we have a choice to give in to the emotion or change the power it has over us by doing something different. That being human and having the ability to love and care for one another hurts. Sharing a hurt, doesn't make it go away, but it does lessen the pain. Through all our aches and pains, our group achieved over £7000, a

magnificent total.







### Did you know that small giving can be beautiful?

You probably know that charities such as churches can reclaim income tax paid on the amount people donate, but many people are outside this system because they pay little or no Income Tax.

You may NOT know that the government now operates a similar system for ALL SMALL CASH donations from donors who do not qualify for Gift Aid.

Therefore it is called the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme.

At the end of the tax year the church sends to the government the total of all recorded small cash donations

received in envelopes OR loose cash, and HMRC sends back to the charity an amount equal to 25% of that total of cash giving.

This obviously applies to the money given to the church **in collections**, provided that the donation is:

a) IN CASH, The scheme does NOT apply to giving by cheque or bank transfers

b) NOT MORE THAN £30 (from April 2019) given in an envelope or loose

SO, if you do not pay income tax, you can boost your giving to the church by **giving**Cash, not exceeding £30 at one time,

using the Emmanuel weekly or monthly envelopes.

For every £1 given in cash, the church gains another 25p (ie just like Gift Aid!)




# Confirmation at All Saints in Northampton


