

Friends,

It feels like a long time since I've had the opportunity to sit down and write to you all. I'm glad to be able to do it today. Usually, my view as I write these letters has been of a grey and wet day, but today as I look out of my office window, I can see a blue sky, sunshine and signs of plants and trees coming to fullness of life.



It's a wonderful time of year, least of all because the end (please let it be so) of the cold, damp weather for a season brings a corresponding rapid decrease in my own aches and pains, as I know it does for many of you. I'm hoping to enjoy and make the most of this season of muscles working a little better and feeling a little more flexible physically altogether. I would say that I wished we lived in a time of permanent summer but, in the words of a popular book and television series that has had a lot of attention recently, 'winter is coming'. Life is designed in seasons. There is a time for everything, as the Bible tells us in Ecclesiastes 3.

All of us, if we're fortunate to live for a long period of years, will experience a good deal of what life has to offer, or sometimes seem to throw at us. The question is, are we the same kind of person when things are good as we are when things are not? Are we able to truthfully say, or sing, to God 'I will trust in You alone' all the time, some of the time, or not much of the time at all? That's the question I've been asking myself about my own life and faith recently. How far does my trust go? All the way back in Exodus 14, "the Israelites saw the mighty hand of the Lord displayed against the Egyptians, the people feared the Lord and put their **trust** in him and in Moses his servant".

We know that God's people in scripture were a little fickle with their trust, apt to try and find some marginal gains by trusting God one minute and then the next finding another to put their trust in. We also know that this did not go well for them. And yet many of us, even when we've trusted God for a long time, can easily place our trust in someone or something else when it seems like He lets us down. We don't get what we dreamed of, hoped for or felt we needed. Or it seems that way, at least.

I've been harping on about trust and heart for what seems like more than a year now. Sorry if it gets repetitive. The thing is, I think they are so foundational both to us as people but also to the whole Church. How do we decide what to do as a Church? We trust God and see where He leads us, we set our hearts right, realising that He has given us huge gifts, but that we only achieve anything useful with Him. We realise and admit that this is His Church and that He will build it. We can do all of those things, whilst making sure we look after what we've been given, including the people who are part of our family, as well as we can.

We have responsibilities and opportunities as members of God's family, but He is the head of the household. We are invited to sit and eat together at His table. He could turn any of us, or anyone else away, but chooses to always extend an invitation to anyone who seeks to eat with Him and receive what He wants to give.

So my question is this: are we like Jesus? Do we trust God and go where He invites us to go? Am I? I hope so. This next season in the life of our Church, we will be reminding ourselves what it means to be Jesus-shaped. It's never a bad time to do that.

I want to encourage all of you, however much time you spend praying, whatever prayer is like for you, to pray for our Churches. We do a lot and have lots of opportunities for more, in partnership with other local Churches and community groups. We also need to look after each other and nurture one another so that we our faith grows and we become a stronger, more generous and open family.

One of the things good families do is eat together. Maybe say hello to the person you sit next to at Church the next time you're there and invite them for a meal. It might make their day (or month, or year). It's my job as one of the senior leaders in the Church to help us grow together as a family, the kind of family which is loving and secure enough to welcome new people as they are adopted into it. Pray for me, please, as I try to do that

If you are a caring grandparent, can you imagine being told that you can no longer see your grandchildren? It will come as a complete shock to your system and usually happens as a result of the divorce of one of your married children, a family dispute or mental health issues. The relationship between grandparents and their grandchildren is special and to be told it has to come to an end can be devastating. For many grandparents it is like a living bereavement.

When Jim and Elsie found that their married daughter was divorcing after five years of marriage they were deeply saddened, especially for the two children George and Alice aged 2 and 4 years respectively. However, a year later she remarried and her new husband took a dislike to her parents. He was a controlling character and forced their daughter to break her relationship with Jim and Elsie.

Jim and Elsie were devastated and so shocked by the estrangement of their daughter and their two grandchildren that they couldn't think where to turn for help. They were frightened to tell their friends in case they were blamed for the fall out. They had no idea of their legal rights or indeed the rights of the grandchildren to see them.

Eventually Elsie picked up a leaflet at the doctor's surgery. It was from Granpart, a local organisation that gives support to estranged grandparents and those who only have limited contact with their grandchildren. On the leaflet were the contact details for Marion Turner who runs the Granpart support group. Elsie finally found the courage to ring Marion and tell her story. Marion invited Jim and Elsie to the support group who meet monthly in Harpole, Northamptonshire.

They went to the next meeting where they were warmly welcomed and found other Grandparents in similar and far worse situations than their own. In a relaxed, confidential atmosphere they heard similar stories to theirs and eventually they were able to discuss their estrangement with other members. It can take a few meetings to tell your story as it can be very harrowing, but there is a box of tissues available for the tellers as well as the listeners. There is also plenty of advice from members and from visiting specialists who will help you to find a path for the future.

This is a typical story with fictitious names but, unfortunately more common than you would believe!

The tragic fire at Note Dame Cathedral shocked the whole world. Seeing such a magnificent building engulfed in flames saddened all who saw the devastation unfold. It was a monumental blow to the nation of France. It will take years to rebuild this famous place of worship.

One striking image from the fire showed the interior of the church scorched and ruined, its art treasures lost, its contents still smouldering. But high up in the background, unbowed by the flames, stands a golden cross, brightly shining in the darkness of the surrounding debris.



Since the fire took place at Easter, it is hard not to see this picture as a parable. One Anglican vicar made this comment: 'Notice what is left inside, untouched, after the destruction of all sorts of 'priceless' works of arts at Norte Dame Cathedral? The Cross. What an image for Holy Week and what a picture to describe secular Western Europe.'

As I pondered the picture it spoke to me of the abiding value of the Cross. The words of a hymn came to mind:

In the cross of Christ I glory, Tow'ring o'er the wrecks of time; All the light of sacred story Gathers round its head sublime.

The place of worship may be destroyed, but not the God we worship. The message of the Cross, at the centre of our faith, remains a timeless, undamaged truth.

The hymn continues:

When the woes of life o'ertake me, Hopes deceive, and fears annoy, Never shall the cross forsake me, Lo! It glows with peace and joy.

Even among the ruins of our own lives the Cross stands tall, reminding us of the presence of God and His grip on our lives.

As a long-standing member of the Diocesan Board of Education (DBE), I am always keen to promote ways in which people can become involved in their local schools, particularly church schools. (As some of you may recall I was for some years chair of governors at Emmanuel Middle School; in fact, some of you served as governors whilst I was there.)

Below you can see some information about an exciting new initiative from the Diocese. The link between church schools and their parish church should be strong and productive. This is often led by the incumbent – vicar/rector/priest/minister - and considerably enhanced when church members also involve themselves.

Haydon, Phil and others from Emmanuel go into schools in our parish. Did you know that we have 15 schools in total?

Bishop's School Supporters Releasing and equipping church members for ministry and mission in schools

What is a Bishop's School Supporter?

A Bishop's School Supporter helps the Bishops and the Diocesan Board of Education in their ministry to schools by providing support in one or more of the following areas:

i listening to children read supportively

i sharing their faith story and responding to questions sensitively in the context of an RE lesson and supporting schools in their pursuit of the RE Quality Mark

i leading collective worship and helping pupils to plan and lead collective worship for their peers

helping with extracurricular Messy Church or an extracurricular Christian club.

We expect you will be a committed Christian who wants to takes an active interest in the broader life of a school which might include attending collective worship or school church services, praying for the school community, supporting school performances or helping at school events and on trips, as well as supporting in the ways detailed above for which training will be provided.

You will need: a background in education eg as a student, teacher or governor

 $_{\rm i}$ you will need to offer time - you will be linked with one or more schools (the amount is up to you) which you would be willing to visit at least twice per term, but ideally for about an hour weekly

 $_{\rm i}\,$ transport - you will be responsible for getting yourself to the various schools

 $_{\rm i}\,$ a willingness to share your individual skills, talents and faith to enrich the life of a school.

How do I become a Bishop's School Supporter?

We would ask you to contact the Education Office on 01604 887060

or email education@peterborough-diocese.org.uk to book yourself on the training programme.

You will be asked to undergo a Disclosure Barring Service check and references will be requested.

When the application and training process is satisfactorily completed you will be offered one or more schools to visit, according to your availability; we will try to locate this school close to your home.

How to fill in a form

Solomon took a census of all the foreigners residing in Israel, after the census his father David had taken; and they were found to be 153,600. He assigned 70,000 of them to be carriers and 80,000 to be stonecutters in the hills... (2 Chronicles 2:17-18)

We can spend much of our working life filling in forms of one sort or another. Sometimes we struggle to complete an online form and have to use the telephone help-line. The young people who help us on the end of the line can leave us feeling that we are obviously idiots.

Do you like filling in forms? No, of course not! No-one does. There are a few censuses in the Bible, which are a type of form. The above quotation is about authorities getting information to use for their benefit to get people in work.

Do you always have to give the details they ask for? No! If you just bought an electric iron does the manufacturer *really* need to know your name, address, date of birth, number of people in your house and cat's mother's name? If not, then why are they asking for such details? Always be careful about what information you give out, and to whom.

Sometimes if you are in debt you are asked to fill in a budget form. Again, be careful. Do they really need to know your employer's name and address and your bank details?



On the other hand, do not forget to include every item of expenditure. If you just put down your earnings and the amount you spend at the supermarket it may look as you have plenty of money. Remember bus fares, school meals, rent, council tax, telephones and all the rest.

There is never enough space on most forms, thought they must know email addresses are usually long. Then there are questionnaires asking you to rate the experience. Was the webpage helpful? Why was it helpful.... and suddenly you may be asked to give away yet more information about yourself... be careful. As a general rule, try and give as little as possible, just sufficient for the task in hand.

What do you call the church service where Jesus' last meal with His apostles is re-enacted? And does it matter what we call it?

The word 'Eucharist' comes from the Greek word *eucharistia*, which is itself a translation of the Hebrew word *berekah*. All three words have the meaning of thanksgiving, or praise for the wonderful works of God. So, we are giving thanks for all that God has done for us and all that Jesus has achieved through His life, death and resurrection.

'Communion', according to the Cambridge dictionary, has the meaning of being in a close relationship with someone in which feelings and thoughts are exchanged. So, at Communion we are together with Christ and with each other.

The term 'The Lord's Table' refers to recalling the last meal that Jesus ate with His apostles, and doing so in remembrance of Him.

There is a lovely invitation which is sometimes used to invite people to come forward to receive the bread and wine which goes along these lines:

Come to this table,

not because you must but because you may, Come, when you are fearful, doubtful or in need; to be held by the God who made you and loves you.

It is the table of company with Jesus, and all who love him.

It is the table of sharing with the poor of the world with whom Jesus identified himself.

Come. It is Christ who invites us to meet Him here.

What's important is not so much what we call this act of worship but rather our attitude in accepting this invitation from the Lord Himself.
