A Winter Flock

This is the season of bird song and, if you're up early enough, the dawn chorus. Our native birds are busy breeding, and they are joined by summer migrants, many of whom sing spectacularly; blackcaps, willow warblers and chiffchaffs can be heard in most little patches of woodland. It's a thrilling sound, though maybe not so much fun if you're one of the birds.

Birds sing to attract a mate, and to announce their presence in their territory. They sing loudly to proclaim their physical fitness, which is attractive to a mate, and intimidating to a rival. Bird song is competitive. It's a matter of breeding success, even of survival. The birds are not enjoying a bit of musical creativity. They are magnificently, perhaps desperately, strutting their stuff.

They need a territory at this time of year so that they will have enough food for the hungry young about to hatch in their nests. Many of our birds feed on the little green caterpillars that are everywhere up in the tree tops. The caterpillars are trying to gorge on the new leaves while they are still soft, and the birds are trying to gorge on the caterpillars before they're all gone. They sing to assert their sole right to the caterpillars and other insect life in a small group of trees. They will spend the long daylight hours flying from nest to treetop and back with a beak full of grubs.

When the breeding season is over most birds stop defending territories. They are only eating for one, and can find their meals in a more leisurely way, roaming over larger areas, and not worrying if they overlap with others. Woodlands and gardens become quiet, and the birds recover from the intense strain of breeding. Only the robin maintains a territory throughout the year, so, if you hear a bird sing in November or December, it is almost certain to be a robin.



In the coldest weeks of winter, small birds often leave gardens for the countryside in search of food. Not only are they no longer territorial, but some species form mixed flocks - blue tits, coal tits and great tits visiting field edges together, or various finches moving over the hedgerows searching for berries. These winter flocks are the opposite of the season of bird song.

I think the winter flock is a good metaphor for the church. We also are a group made of very different sorts. We welcome all who want to travel together. We are not interested in looking or sounding good, and definitely not in trying to make others look small, but we look out for each other. We are hungry, and can find good things better together. We are brought together by our need, not our strength. If we are strong, it is because we move as one, carefully keeping in touch with each other, the slow and the speedy, adapting as we go.

The showy will always look cool. But the good group, untidy though it may look, that has real power.

I write this in early April, just back from a week of House of Lords duty: saying prayers at the beginning of each day's debates, taking part in those debates, acting as chaplain to the peers. The road to Brexit is a bumpy one. The direction is unclear. Achieving (or avoiding) Brexit is far from straightforward. We could end up in any of a great variety of places as regards our future relationship with the EU and with other allies and trading partners. The news changes from day to day, and there is no clear voice—only speculation, rumour and guesswork.

Contrast the bumpy road, and the lack of clarity about our direction, with the wonderful words of scripture as brought to musical life in Handel's Messiah. I've calmed myself down from the frantic confusion of Parliament by listening again to this wonderful music, and giving a talk on it in one of our parishes.

The voice of him that cri'eth in the wilderness: Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be exalted, and every mountain and hill made low; the crooked straight and the rough places plain.

O thou that tellest good tidings to Zion, get thee up into the high mountain; O thou that tellest good tidings to Jerusalem, lift up thy voice with strength; lift it up, be not afraid: say unto the cities of Judah, Behold your God! Arise, shine, for thy light is come, and the glory of the Lord is risen upon thee.

In the political uncertainties of our world, we can find real certainty. Our future is bright with Christ. We have good news to tell. We can have confidence instead of fear. With best wishes,

Do you, or don't you? Many of us feel reluctant to admit that we would like to do it, even if usually we do not. Have a snooze after lunch, that is.


A 20-minute nap seems to work wonders – many studies find that people awake feeling refreshed, with their energy levels renewed and with a much-improved mental focus.

We are still eagerly awaiting our first female member!




Easter Da Celebrations

New point for pencil factory


The Keswick Convention will be moving all their activities into a renovated factory. The annual Christian conference has been going since 1875, putting on Christian seminars and Bible teaching each summer for thousands of people. The Lake District National Park Development committee unanimously voted to support the planning application for the renovation.

The entire convention will move to the site of a former pencil factory, with old warehousing being cleared to provide space for the convention's main marquee.

They currently meet at a show ground but also in churches and meeting spaces across the town. The pencil factory building will be modernised to provide toilet facilities, accommodation, meeting rooms and a conference centre.

The refurbishment will also host Keswick Ministries' teaching courses and be open for visiting church groups, schools and local community groups. The space may also be used by other organisations from around the country.

James Robson, ministry director of Keswick Ministries said, "This is a wonderful milestone in our charity's 140-year history and for the town of Keswick. The site, which has been derelict for ten years, will be transformed into a facility that the town and the people of the Lake District can be proud of."



My celebrations included a meal at a local lake-side pub where over 30 colleagues from World Horizons joined me. I also went to see the musical Les Miserables with my sister Alison and spent a few days with my parents in Northampton where we saw the Mousetrap at the theatre and went out for a couple of meals.



Prayer on the road

World Horizons starts the year with a month of prayer during January. This year our theme concerned different people-groups around the world who have little or no knowledge of who Jesus is. We also prayed for the future direction of World Horizons during its present time of transition. Our own nation was also prayed for in this time of political uncertainty.

During the third week we decided to go out from our building for a couple of days as an extension of our prayer. As we prayed, we asked God where we should go and divided up into small teams, joining with those who felt led to pray in a similar location.

I went with a group to Gloucester, where we prayer-walked around the city centre, including the cathedral. Gloucester is the home of 'Frightfest' the biggest Halloween event in the UK and there are many 'new age' and darkly mystical shops. We felt the need to pray for the light of God's presence to shine. On the Sunday we visited a Baptist Church where we were given a warm welcome.

Back in Wales, it was really inspiring to hear stories from all the groups. Some met people they were able to pray with, others were able to share in churches; others randomly met people they had met before or found that they had a mutual friend.

A group that went to Birmingham found themselves wandering the back streets of 'the Balti Triangle' looking for lunch on the Saturday afternoon. They were invited to 'come into our restaurant' by a man on the street. The restaurant turned out to be a shed down a back alley. They assumed he was the owner but it turned out he was a taxi driver. His name meant 'light of religion'. They were able to pray for him and give him a word of encouragement. He was so grateful he offered to buy them lunch!

What's in your name?

This Spring, millions of people will be curious to know what Meghan and Prince Harry name their first baby. Journalists will fill columns of newsprint, speculating on why they chose that name, how it will fit in with the rest of the royal names, and how 'fashionable' it may become.

But we all have a name. It's perhaps the only thing that we'll possess throughout our entire lives. It's often the first thing strangers ask about us, and although we have the power to change it, few of us do. There's often a story behind why we have that name, and many people have strong feelings – whether positive or negative – towards it.

Whether we like it or not, our names define us. Although this is certainly less the case now than it has been in the past, names tell us a lot about a person – from gender to race to socioeconomic background and more. Our name can even have the power to shape our self-esteem and influence how we're seen and treated by others.

Names are particularly significant in the Bible – bound up with identity, origin, birth circumstances, or even the 'divine purpose' of that person. Right from the start of Genesis, we see the importance of names. The name

'Adam' provides a pun on the word for 'ground', from which he is formed. Abram, 'exalted father' becomes

Abraham, 'father of many nations'. Samuel, the longed-for child of Hannah, means 'God hears'.

Our names form a part of our faith, too. In Isaiah 43:1, it is said that God has "summoned you by name"; a declaration that is reflected in the Anglican confirmation Service: 'God has called you by name and made you His own'.

In Ephesians 3 Paul begins his prayer for the Ephesians with these powerful words:

"For this reason I kneel before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth derives its name."

Whether we love, hate, or are completely ambivalent towards our given names, this verse reminds us that, ultimately, they pale in significance to our family name — that which is given to us when we become adopted heirs of God in Christ. Belonging, community, and family ultimately goes back to God himself, and are reflected most truly in relationship with Him.



The story behind the hymn: 'Alleluia, Alleluia! Give Thanks to the Risen Lord'



Not many university students are able to write Christian songs which become worldwide hits, but Don Emry Fishel managed it with his Alleluia No.

1. Nearly 50 years on, it is loved and sung by mil-

1. Nearly 50 years on, it is loved and sung by millions of Christians worldwide.

Fishel wrote it in 1971, while he was a student at the University of Michigan and also music leader of a Roman Catholic charismatic community based in Ann Arbor, Michigan. These were the days of folk songs and guitars, and Alleluia No. 1 fitted the prevailing mood perfectly. Written in E Major, it is ideal for guitar accompaniment.

Mr Fishel became a freelance flutist, flute instructor and composer. He was publications editor for the Word of God and Servant Music for a number of years, and then worked in computers for 25 years. In 2008 he moved to Nashville and returned to music, teaching the flute.

Alleluia No 1 was Fishel's first song, written "rather quickly, in about an hour." It had four verses to begin with, but a fifth verse (which became the third verse) was added later, as he prepared for baptism. As Fishel explained, he wanted the line 'We have been crucified with Christ; now we shall live forever' "to be the centre of the song."

Alleluia No. 1 was first published in the UK in Sound of Living Waters, in 1974.

The 'History Makers' tour will start in February 2019 and will run until June 2019, visiting St Giles on the 18th of May.

The New Life Choir is a group of 20 children who are beneficiaries of Abaana's projects across Uganda. They will represent their local communities by singing their way around the UK and Ireland, acting as ambassadors for their friends and families still living in poverty.

The choir will perform both Ugandan and English gospel songs and tell their testimonies. Abaana's aim is to raise awareness of third world poverty, find sponsors for an additional 200–300 children and rescue more children from a life on the streets.

500 new child sponsorships were set up as a direct result of the 2017 New Life Choir tour and six young boys were rescued from a life on the streets and brought into Abaana's New Life Homes.
