

Hello everyone, welcome to November.

I hope you are all having a good month so far. How many shopping days are left until Christmas? Probably best not to ask,! So instead, here's another question:

Have you read or heard Jesus's prayer in John 17 recently?

You might already be thinking, even as you read the question, 'goodness, the Vicar's not messing around this month is he', but hang in there with me.

As we've been thinking about prayer over the last couple of months, one of the key things that has come back to me again and again is trying to pray myself, and how to encourage us to all to pray in ways that are effective. If we're going to pray, there needs to be a point to it, otherwise why bother? Why go on about it so much? I hope that you've enjoyed our focus so far and that it has encouraged you, most of all, to think about praying yourself.



John 17 is a long prayer. Jesus is saying these things, I think, for two reasons. One is that He wants them to happen. A good reason to pray.

Secondly, He says them in this way, in this moment because He wants those who have become His followers, and His friends over time, and have seen Him go through so much; To hear His hopes, His vision, His deep desire for the way that people who call themselves His followers and friends are going to live.

A lot of us have prayed out loud, things that we want those around us to hear. Go on, admit it. We do it with the best of intentions, mostly because we think if people heard the heart behind what we're saying, we would all be more likely to be moving along in the right direction. In the right circumstances it

can be really helpful. In the wrong ones it can be very bad, verging on abusive. We must be careful. Fortunately, Jesus prays a lot of things that are going to help His friends and followers in the future. You'll have to read the whole chapter to get the whole picture. I'd recommend it.

Jesus prays that His followers might be one, as He and the Father are one (verse 21) and just in case we don't understand what that means - and we would be forgiven if we didn't - He follows it up with 'as you are in me Father and I am in you'. And still further, '...and may they be in us so that the world will believe you sent me.'

JESUS WANTS HIS FOLLOWERS TO BE AS CLOSE, AS UNIFIED, AS SURE IN SHARED PURPOSE AND VISION AS JESUS AND THE FATHER ARE THEMSELVES.

If you've ever found yourself unsure about prayer, or about the point of Church, or why we call ourselves 'A family of faith where there's always room for one more', I think this helps to explain it. Jesus wants His followers to be as close, as unified, as sure in shared purpose and vision as Jesus and the Father are themselves.

Doesn't this blow your mind a little bit? We know that Jesus only did what He saw the Father doing. We know that He did all He could to follow the instructions He was given. To proclaim freedom, release, healing, life, the year of the Lord's favour and that people long forgotten about would themselves rebuild the forgotten places of the world - which God had not forgotten about, even if people had done.

GOD IS NOT DISTANT. HE IS IN US. WE ARE IN HIM IF WE PUT OUR TRUST IN HIM AND FOLLOW HIS LEAD. THAT SHOULD, AT THE VERY LEAST, MAKE US A HOPE-FILLED BUNCH OF PEOPLE WHO ARE KEEN TO SHARE GOOD NEWS AND *BE* GOOD NEWS.

We know this stuff and we know that times of prayer, of speaking and listening to God, were key to all of this. Jesus wants us to be as 'one' in our purpose of sharing the good news as that. And more than that, Jesus seeks for those who follow Him to be 'in' God.

I think we don't focus on this enough. The relationship, the foundation of our life together that we are offered as we follow God, is one of being as close to God as Jesus and the Father are to each other.

This is a deep and knotty theological subject, but I want to simply say here that if we knew how close we were invited to be to God, wouldn't that increase our confidence a little bit as we went to Him in prayer? God is not distant. He is in us. We are in Him if we put our trust in Him and follow His lead. That should, at the very least, make us a hope-filled bunch of people who are keen to share good news and *be* good news.

Before I go, a few things,,.

Firstly, welcome to Micha and Katrin, who have joined us from Germany until just before Christmas, as they prepare for a life of mission in Bangladesh. They will be involved in lots of bits of Church life over the next few weeks, so do speak to them if you get the chance, perhaps invite them for dinner....

Secondly, a note of thanks to Jo Alderman, who has stood down from the post of Foodbank Manager over the last couple of weeks. Jo has done a fabulous job during her time here and we pray for her, that God will guide her as she moves into what is next. Thanks too to those who are working on finding a replacement for her.

Thirdly, have a look at The Edge Network. https://www.theedge.org.uk/edge-network

I enjoyed being at the launch of this recently. It looks to be an exciting opportunity for Churches like ours to partner with others around the country who work with those who live on estates. I'm looking forward to seeing how this develops. Partnerships are the way forward in seeking to serve God, people and communities and this one looks to be very good indeed.

Room for One More

This is the talk that I would have been sharing with our congregations, so instead I've written it for you to read.

We continue to live in such a challenging area, and the community in which we serve is really struggling. We try to reach them but don't always know how to. You may have seen the 'Welcome to Northampton East Churches' cards being delivered in different areas of Northampton East and we pray that people will look at the different websites to see what goes on locally and join in activities or services.

I'm sure you've heard of FISH, but just in case you haven't, it stands for Food and Fun In School Holidays.

We started in October 2017 providing food and entertainment for families, one lunchtime a week, in each week of the school holidays. We have been so blessed by the numbers coming, often feeding over 100 people each week; all served by our wonderful volunteers from our local churches and beyond. We have served more than 1700 meals in the 20 times we have run it and now are expanding with another FISH at Brookside community centre on Mondays of school holidays.

I've been going along to the council as an alleged 'expert' on food poverty with the intention of finding a way forward; in particular about school holiday hunger. Please pray that the right outcomes are found, to help those in our community.

We are continually looking for ways to go beyond foodbank and, although we pray that ultimately there won't be a need for foodbanks, some of the people who use the foodbank need support in more ways than just food. We would like to offer help to people with managing their finances and are looking to set up a debt centre. Volunteers will work in pairs to help people to clear their debt. The volunteers don't need to be financial whizzes because training is available. But they should be good listeners; and have a reasonable grasp of their own finances. If you want to know more please speak to me, we are looking to get 4/5 people on board.

We are always looking for newbies to join our foodbank team. There are lots of roles available, packing, reception and referrers on a Wednesday, which is our main foodbank serving day. We also need people on Tuesdays when we sort and date the food that is donated over the week and on Fridays, when we repack the boxes we emptied on Wednesday. Our foodbank continues to be really busy, serving and packing about 40 parcels a week, so you can see why we need more people to help.

Here is a quick whizz round some other things we are running at the minute, or about to happen.

I now run a board games cafe. It is open to anyone, and we spend time talking and playing cards, dominos or board games. We tend to play easier games, then we can all join in. It runs in Café Emm between 2 & 3:30, on the first and third Mondays of the month. The weekly drop-in, called Coffee, Cake and Chat, continues at Brookside Hub each Thursday.

I really would appreciate prayers that more new people will come along to both the board games café and Coffee cake and Chat. You hear much about social isolation, or people having nothing to do. and so we try to provide opportunities for people to socialise and join in activities. We pray people are able to find out about the different groups.

On a Friday, I help at a youth group called Rzone at Rectory Farm It is a youth club for 8-

13's run by the church. It runs every Friday during term time from 5pm for just an hour. We need new helpers to join our team. Please contact me if you are interested.

We are back at the Lumbertubs <u>Pub on Thursday 12th December</u> <u>for what is becoming our annual</u> <u>Christmas sing along with</u> <u>Boothville Community Choir, and</u> <u>on 24th December, we are also</u> <u>part of Elwes Arms celebrations</u> <u>from 8pm.</u>

Finally, (honestly) I'd like to let you know about the pastoral care training.

I am now in the second year of the training. It's been quite a journey, with re-learning how to learn. Some of the topics and studies have been challenging but I know it will be worth it in the end. God is guiding me through the training, which is for pastoral care service in our community.

I've titled this, 'Always room for one more'. When I reflect what has happened in my role, I give thanks for those who offer their help through volunteering, and pray for more people who may be able to help others in our community and for ways for us to advertise what we run so that isolated people, in particular, are aware and able to come and join in.



Weston Favell Centre has asked us to be part of their Christmas Parade on Saturday 16th November. It is a good opportunity for us to show the real meaning of Christmas, and promote Christmas services in our group and other churches nearby. We are looking for people to dress up as nativity characters; we have the clothes already just need the people on the day. Need to be at Emmanuel about 12pm.

We are running a joint Messy Christmas with other churches again on Saturday 7th December in our foodbank storeroom (previously New Look), it's a great way to show the stories of Christmas in crafts, stories and videos. It runs from 10-12.

Sunrise and Sunset

(A meditation by Deacon Angie Allport)

There are two very special moments each day - sunrise and sunset. Let us focus on these for a moment..

Take the sun's rising; having extinguished the stars, ever so slowly and gently, it eases itself over the rim of the world.

Up, up it comes from the great beyond, scattering light and radiating heat to the earth. We are amazed at how large it appears. It is at its largest when it sits on the horizon, joining heaven and earth. It seems to pose there fleetingly before it starts to climb the sky and get on with the business of the day.

And take the sun's setting. Down, down it goes. Its rate of departure can be measured by the fading light and waning heat. As it retreats, it appears to grow in size once more and is again at its largest when it meets the horizon.

As at its coming, so at its going, it seems to pose briefly on the edge of the world. Then, re-lighting the stars, it slips slowly and silently away into the great beyond from whence it came.

Just as sunrise and sunset are very special moments in the day, so birth and death are very special moments in the life of a human being. At these moments, we realise that a person is absolutely unique. At birth, something comes into being that never was before. At death, something passes away that will never be on earth again.

People seem larger to us at these two moments, when we get a glimpse of their true worth and their gifts. There is something sacred about birth and death. Heaven and earth are joined together. Each person is a mystery; each person is a gift from God.



Songs and Prayers at Westminster

Six hundred people, including MPs, peers and Christian leaders, met in Westminster Hall on a summer's morning, to sing worship songs and pray as Bishop Sarah Mullally spoke about valuing those who hold opposite opinions. This prayer by SNP MP David Linden is worth sharing:

"Heavenly Father, we thank you for the amazing opportunity to gather here this morning to worship and proclaim your great name and give thanks for our salvation, paid for by the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. And Lord, at this time, we pray for our politics, both here in Westminster and right across these islands.

"Give us wisdom, God, to make wise decisions about our nations' futures, and guide us to decisions which are just and fair. And for those of us who already know you passionately, Lord, I pray that we would disagree well and do so with grace and brotherly love. And Lord, help us to speak truth in power and make decisions which are not for the convenience of merely today or political expediency but instead, help us to make decisions which improve people's lives and advance your kingdom here on Earth. God, I ask that you would use these volatile times to cause people to reflect on where they draw encouragement from. We pray Lord that these too would come to know and love you and recognise the immense sacrifice of your Son, Jesus Christ, Amen."

It is not so easy in the abundance of the new experiences that the soul comes to rest with God. Again and again God invites me: "Come, just sit down with me. I want to give you rest".

- I am happy to be able to start in a protected environment with the Biskup missionary family here in Burundi.

- I am happy to be able to talk to people on the street about Jesus (advantage that you are white - you are always addressed on the street).

 The joy of getting to know different people and their backgrounds
 whether women on the market, in social projects, young adults in the different churches that I have visited to get to know and pray for.

- The joy of having people around me who can explain cultural issues to me and help me to understand.

- Joy that God encourages me so much again and again in His special way, through His Word, through other people. It touches me to be allowed to see his love in it.

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Philippians 4:6+7

- From Sunday 29/09/2019 I will be in Bukeye until the end of December. A place that lies in the interior of the country. The aim is to learn the language (Kirundi) as much as possible and to dive into the Burundi culture to understand it better. Missionaries from other missionary organisations work there.

- What place has God prepared after the experience of the interior? In the international, lively and active church - CLM - there are many possibilities.

- The question of where I will live afterwards is also connected with this.

- To keep my gaze on Jesus - HIS beauty, HIS glory, HIS holiness, HIS all-sufficiency - no matter what the feelings are.

- Every day is different and every day new to hear in dependence on Jesus: "Jesus, what have you prepared today, what should I learn today, be present or do something, where I have to step in?"

- To learn more and more what it means to love in humility.

- For the country of Burundi with its many young people and with its often "sleeping" legacy of genocide - for peace - for forgiveness - for restoration.

HE is doing it!
