Dear friends,

How are you?

For some of us the reflex answer to that question has been 'fine' for so long that even if we don't mean it, especially if we don't mean it actually, that's what comes out of our mouths. Isn't that a little strange?

I hope you've had good times since Christmas and over the new year and that 2020 has started really well for you. If it has, let's celebrate, be thankful to God and use the stories of good things that have taken place as fuel, as energy for our prayers, our worship and our outreach at the start of this year.

If the last few months, the last few years even have been average, poor, rubbish even - and here's the key - let's use the stories we've gained, heard and that we can tell about what has happened as fuel, as energy for our prayers, our worship and our outreach at the start of this year. People who put their trust in God and seek to live in the way that God asks people to live have never had it easy. In a lot of cases in the past and in the present and, I would fully expect, in the future, to say that you are seeking to go God's way is actually pretty likely to end up with life getting to be pretty difficult in a variety of ways, some fairly minor and others much more major.

So, what's good news about that? If I can't promise someone who has heard of Jesus that their life is going to become amazingly much better as soon as they put their trust in Him *on the surface* (and note that, friends), how will we get anyone to take the leap of faith and trust that turning to Jesus requires of us?

I often read passages such as 'You have turned my mourning into joyful dancing. You have taken away my clothes of mourning and clothed me with joy, that I might sing praises to you and not be silent. O Lord my God, I will give you thanks forever!' (Psalm 30:11-12)

and think: 'that feels so far away' whether I'm thinking about other people or situations or what is happening in the wider world, or even in my own life at times.

One thing I counsel myself with at times like this is that the job of the Church is first and foremost to introduce people to Jesus Christ, to worship Him as Lord and King ourselves

and to seek to do what the Bible tells us He would do, to make His priorities ours. The passage I quoted above does not say 'church services' or 'committee meeting' turned mourning into dancing and clothed people with joy that the psalmist might praise God and not be silent. These things might help us at times and be crucial at least some of the time, but they themselves don't cause us to thank God forever.- Some meetings do seem to go on forever, though...

It's knowing God, His life, love and freedom that I have seen make a person truly thankful, whatever the circumstances or situations life throws at them. It's only knowing God that truly makes the phrase 'trusting God' seem even vaguely realistic or possible when the stuff of life happens.

So as we talk about outreach and introducing people to Jesus over the next few months, much as I would love and will be glad to welcome new people joining us for services, house groups and any of the many, many other things we do, I hope what will gladden all of our hearts most of all is if we see people meeting Jesus for themselves, putting their trust in Him and, and this is something I'd love to see, us needing to make regular use of the Emmanuel baptistry!

As I write this, I'm thinking of Phil and Becky Snelson, two people who have spent many years living out this kind of faith, whatever has happened to them and their family.

Phil and Becky leave Emmanuel at the end of February for Phil to return to Circuit Ministry for the whole of his working week. I have loved working alongside Phil these last five and a half years. He is a good friend, a great minister, a very good man and I am very thankful for him and all he has done for me over the years. I am sure each reading this who knows him will think similarly.

Becky, too has given so much to the life of our Churches in ways that have been seen publicly and felt privately by many people too. We will miss them greatly. I pray that this next phase of Phil's ministry sees him, and them, flourish in work, leisure and health.

The Neighbourhood Prayer Network's vision is to see every one of the 260,000 streets in the UK covered in Christian Prayer. The statistics on Wednesday 22nd January 2020 were: Streets Prayed for 5,619, Houses Prayed for 567,519, People Prayed for 1,348,560.

Their objective is to encourage individuals to take spiritual responsibility for the street where they live.

I signed up and registered my street about three years ago and while I don't pretend that I've done all the things that are suggested, I try to be a good neighbour and have been praying for them; including those I don't know yet. I have recently moved and so I now have a whole new set of neighbours to get to know!

The NPN Way is:

Prayer, Care and Share to Transform our Nation.

Prayer is to pray for a few of your neighbours every day. I began by praying for the people I knew by name and others by house number but it is good to find out more names along the way. It feels more personal, even though they may not know they are being prayed for.

Care is to show kindness for a Neighbour, each week if possible. That could be; offering a lift, getting some shopping, picking up a prescription, taking a bin out, or just have a chat and maybe a cuppa with a lonely neighbour, or invite someone over for food....

Share your faith with your Neighbours. Now that sounds scary! But it can be as easy as to send a card at Easter or Christmas, or arrange a Macmillan Coffee Morning or something similar and create opportunities for you to share your faith.

It's interesting to reflect how much what I have learned has already helped me through many situations, and I pray that God continues to use my training to help the people who I encounter. Whether that is at our church, at the community events I run, or when with others involved in community work.



Lent Fasting

This month sees the start of Lent, the season of penitence, self-examination and fasting running up to Easter.

Fasting can be a neglected discipline, but it plays an important part in the Christian life. Jesus began His earthly ministry by fasting in the wilderness for 40 days and taught His disciples to fast (i.e. not *if* but *'when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that it will not be obvious to others that you are fasting, but only to your Father, who is unseen.'* (Matthew 6:17,18).

Why Fast?

Firstly, giving up something in my life underlines my desire to put God first in my life. Secondly, fasting shows me how much I depend on things other than God in my life, so I can surrender my idols to Him. Thirdly, fasting encourages me to have a deeper hunger and dependency for God in my life. Therefore, fasting gives me space to humbly focus on God for His strength, provision, and wisdom and results in a more intimate relationship with Christ. It also enables the Holy Spirit to reveal my true spiritual condition, leading to brokenness, repentance, and a transformed life, with a heart more attentive to God.

How can I fast?

Usually fasting involves missing one or two meals during the day, although some can't abstain from food for medical reasons. It might also include abstaining or limiting the time I give to television, alcohol or social media. However, Lent can also be a time to embrace new spiritual disciplines e.g. joining a study group, 'random acts of kindness', or giving more time to prayer and Bible study. Whatever you do, make Lent count this year! *'Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for right-*

eousness, for they will be filled.' (Matthew 5:6). Revd Paul Hardingham



What's in a Food Parcel?

Foodbanks provide a minimum of three days' nutritionally balanced, non-perishable tinned and dried foods that have been donated by the local community. Trussell Trust have worked with nutritionists to develop a food parcel that contains sufficient nutrition for adults and children, for at least three days of healthy, balanced meals for individuals and families. It is only supposed to be to fill a stop gap, not as their main means of shopping. Without your continued help we could not carry on with this very worthy cause so please give generously and **make a difference now.**

Cop? what is it? Maybe some new programme. Just the thing to kick start your church into 2020? May be "Church of Purpose" – a new programme to release the purpose God has for you. Or perhaps, "Carry on Persevering" – helping you to keep on keep-ing on with God's mission. Or even "Churches of Prayer" – that's something we all need help with.

Well – and perhaps this will disappoint you – it's none of those things. COP stands for the *"Conference of the Parties"* of the *"United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change"*. It's when the nations of the world meet to try and agree what is to be done about the Climate Crisis. They have been meeting for a long time. November 2020 will see the twenty sixth meeting – COP26. You will hear a lot about it as its being hosted by the UK Government in Glasgow and they are bound to make a fuss! And COP26 is not something you should miss as a disciple of Jesus.

At the first meeting back in 1995, the nations present agreed to take steps to tackling climate change. And some progress has been made. Yet, since 1995, levels of Carbon Dioxide have risen by 14%. And people are noticing. In fact, some people were noticing before now.

Twelve years after that first meeting, just before COP13 was held on the Island of Bali in 2007, the Pacific Conference of Churches issued a call to their *"sisters and brothers in Christ throughout the world to act in solidarity with us to reduce the causes of human-induced climate change"*. Perhaps not a call that was heeded, for last December – 12 years later – President Hilda Heine of the Marshall Islands, a group of small islands in the west Pacific, spoke to COP26; *"Water covers much of our land ... as we fight rising tides. It's a fight to the death for anyone not prepared to flee. As a nation we refuse to flee. But we also refuse to die."*

Did people listen? By all accounts. The outcome of December's COP25 in Madrid was a bit of a cop-out. Rich developed countries did not bring plans as to how they will further reduce their carbon dioxide emissions. Large developing nations were reluctant to commit to reducing their emissions before the large rich nations recognised their historic contribution to increasing carbon dioxide and took further steps. And the small, vulnerable nations like the Marshall Islands got caught in the middle.

Let's hope, even pray, that COP26 will be more fruitful and honest. Hey, here's an idea – perhaps when they come together, rather than presenting their plans and *"bigging"* them up with potential *"greenwash"* they need to heed the words of James – *"Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed"* (James 5v16) Maybe we need to listen too. For back in 2007, the call of the Pacific Conference of the Churches was not only to their Christian "brothers and sisters" across the globe to join in their concern and action over climate change. It went further and was more focused; "We issue this call especially to churches in the highly industrialized nations whose societies are historically responsible for the majority of polluting emissions." A message directed at us. Ouch!

Perhaps we need to heed the words of James too. Of course, when we share communion, we need to prepare ourselves, but we seem to have lost the art of confession, especially the accountability of confession to one another. And yet, it comes with a huge promise – "that you may be healed".

As you begin 2020, take time to listen to the voices of those impacted by climate change. Take time in your worship services to confess how our lives are impacting the environment and other people around the world. It's been a while since this journey began, so why not take stock in your discipleship groups of how you are trying to reduce your carbon and environmental footprint. And where you are struggling, pray for each other so that together you can continue to take small steps into God's future for the planet.

From now until November 2020, and beyond, we need to be embraced by COP. We need to be the "Church of Purpose", joining in God's call to care for creation, a world created to fulfil his purpose. We will need to "Carry on Persevering", being honest with one another, encouraging and challenging one another through our successes and failures. And we need to "Churches of Prayer" as we face the climate crisis. Remember "the prayer of the righteous a righteous person is powerful and effective." (James 5v16b). It even shapes the climate – remember Elijah;

"Elijah was a human being, even as we are. He prayed earnestly that it would not rain, and it did not rain on the land for three and a half years. Again he prayed, and the heavens gave rain, and the earth produced its crops." (James 5v17,18)

So, let's pray for ourselves and one another. Pray for the leaders of the world as they prepare to meet again in November 2020. Pray for the vulnerable affected today by climate change. And listen to them too. Perhaps we need to humbly ask the COP – the Churches of the Pacific – to pray for us all.

Thank you to all those who contributed to the Baptist Birthday Scheme last year. The total we sent was £220.




