Are you a Doctor?

Patients who haven't met me before sometimes ask 'Who are you?' I wear quite a large yellow name badge that says STUART, but they mean what do I do? What is my job in the hospital? Why am I there on the ward? 'Are you a doctor?' they ask, thinking my clothes are a bit square for a nurse, and because it would be nice if I was - a doctor can get you out. So I say I'm a chaplain, and a bit of conversation I am very familiar with happens:

'What's that?'

'I'm a minister.'

Blank look.

'Like a vicar or a priest?'

A glimmer of understanding. 'What do you do then?'

'I listen to people. Talk to them. About God and life and so on.'

I'm significantly embarrassed by this point. What sort of job is it if you can't easily explain who you are and what you do? 'I talk to people about God and life and so on,' is a truly terrible job description. Chaplain clearly doesn't communicate to many people, and in fact we have renamed ourselves the Spiritual and Pastoral Care Service. I wouldn't call it a clarification, though. If you counted the minutes you would find I do indeed do far more listening than talking, but listening seems such a feeble thing to claim to do. In truth, I don't really know what I do.

What I find, though, over and over again, are patients who want to tell me about God in relation to their lives. People who feel the presence or absence of God very deeply, and who strive and long to bring life and faith together. They are the experts, not me. I am the one being instructed, they are the theologians (though they don't always use God's name). And when it is my turn to speak, it is very often to tell them that they already know about God, because God has long been at work in their lives. And even as I say it, we both know this is an obvious thing.

What I learn at St Andrew's I try to apply elsewhere. Turn on the news or tut with a neighbour, and it's very soon clear that we know about goodness and truth, we feel the pull of justice and joy. God is alive in us and between us. God is no stranger, but is in us already.

This is part of the world turned upside down that Jesus tried to show us. The one who seems to be the teacher is really the learner. The felt absence of God may be the way God is present. Augustine has God say 'Why would you be searching for me if you didn't already know me?' A good question! The problems we diagnose which can make us feel quite depressed about life, are also evidence that we have a vision of a better way for things to be, a better world and people living well within it.

Augustine also says, when describing how he finally found God, 'you were within me all the time, but I was outside myself.' I really like this. And I'm coming to believe that people like chaplains who don't really know what they are doing - listening, maybe? - are really important because we only stop being strangers to ourselves, outside ourselves, if there is someone, a bit like a mirror, to show us who we are, to reflect us back to ourselves.

I think I would like to claim that this is the work of the Body of Christ, of all of us in the Church. We are to be the place where every member, every newcomer, is known, is understood, and is recognised. It is to be the place where we are all able to see ourselves. And all it needs is for most of us to remember that we don't really know what we are doing, and therefore to really look and really listen, and see each other for what we are. A non-judging, unshockable community. A gentle but unflinching gaze.

Not such a difficult task, just so long as we remember we don't entirely know how to do it.

What's in your hand?

September is usually the time when we get back to our normal routines after the summer break.

With the current coronavirus pandemic, it is very different this year! However, it is still a good time to consider how God can use us to make a real difference in our workplace, school, family, friends and community. He equips us with everything we need to make His love known.

When God gave Moses the job of bringing the Israelites out of Egypt, He asked the question:

'What is in your hand?' (Exodus 4:2).

Moses was holding his staff, which represented his livelihood (what he was good at); his resources (his flock represented his wealth) and his security (which God was asking him to lay down).

God asks the same question of us: has God given you? Our gifts, temperament, experience, relationships, mind, education. All can be used in the work God has given us to do.

How will we use them to make a difference in the places where He calls us to serve Him?



John Ortberg, in his book It All Goes Back in the Box, speaks of Johnny, a 19-year-old with Downs syndrome. He worked at a supermarket checkout putting people's items into bags.

To encourage his customers, he decided to put a 'thought for the day 'into the bags. Every night his dad would help him prepare the slips of paper ready for the next day. As he put the thoughts into the bags he would say, 'I hope it helps you have a good day. Thanks for coming here.'

A month later the store manager noticed that Johnny's line at the checkout was three times longer than anyone else's! What People wanted Johnny's thought for the day. He wasn't just filling bags with groceries, he was filling lives with hope! What has God given you to help and encourage others?

a psalm for the pandemic

There are few psalms as personal and real as Psalm 23. It records David's experience of God as his Shepherd going through dark times. In the midst of the effects of a global pandemic, this psalm speaks to the fears that can overwhelm us.

He Knows Me: 'The Lord is my shepherd...' Just as a good shepherd knows every sheep in his flock, so God know each one of us

He Provides for Me: 'He makes me lie down in green pastures...' Just as the shepherd knows the needs of his sheep, so God will provide what we need in our lives and circumstances.

He Guides Me: 'He guides me along the right paths...' Just as the shepherd leads the sheep to the best pastures, so God provides the best for us, as we listen and follow Him.

He Protects Me: 'Even though I walk through the darkest valley...' Just as the sheep have no need to fear danger when following the shepherd, so we live knowing God's presence and protection. He Comforts Me: 'your rod and your staff, they comfort me.' As

the shepherd's rod defends the sheep, and the staff enables him to control the sheep, so God comforts us through His Word and discipline.

The final verses of the psalm (v5-6) offer the security of knowing that our lives are in His hands, even through death, as He leads us to the home we've been looking for all our lives.

Some years ago, a great actor was asked to recite Psalm 23, but asked one of the other guests to do the same. His remarkable rendition was followed by the other man, an older Christian speaking from the heart. Afterwards the actor said: The difference between us is that I know the psalm, but he knows the shepherd.'




Jill Knight

It was with great sadness that we heard the news from John Knight that Jill had passed away on 3rd July after a long illness.

Jill and John played a key role in the life of Emmanuel for many years. They left Zimbabwe with their family in 1986 and spent several months with a fellowship in Theydon Bois, before arriving at Emmanuel in June 1987. They ministered at Emmanuel until their departure ten years later.

Jill was someone for whom prayer was central to her being, and she was soon involved in prayer ministry, counselling and Bible teaching.

John says Jill had a "quite amazing knowledge of the Bible as a result of dedicated study throughout her life."



She also possessed a wonderful sense of humour! There was a period in the 1990s when Emmanuel held New Year's Eve parties and concerts in which the clergy frequently took part. One memorable year Jill was the inspiration behind a concert in which all 5 (yes, 5!) ministers' wives, dressed in frilly skirts, danced to the music from My Fair Lady and ended their performance with the can-can!

Jill and John left Emmanuel for a new ministry in Greens Norton in 1997 and have since lived in Brackley and Marston St Lawrence. Jill unfortunately suffered a stroke in 2018, which left her partially paralysed. However Jill's memory was as sharp as ever and she would often ask visitors for updates about their families and circumstances they couldn't recall ever having told her!

Jill was greatly loved and the vicar in Brackley, in writing to John, said: "Jill is one of the most special people I have ever met – a truly great, prayerful, courageous, kind and thoughtful, dear disciple of the Lord – and an inspiration."

Deliveries and foodbank

I have been working at the foodbank for two days a week. On a Monday, being part of team preparing for the afternoon when people visit to collect their parcels, and on a Friday when we are still doing deliveries to those who can't get out. The deliveries peaked at about 65 parcels delivered by 10 drivers – the logistics were huge, but the team carried it out seamlessly.

Debt Centre

We have been training our team volunteer for a couple of Wednesday mornings. We have had to do it over zoom and is a lot to take in, but the team have been taking it all in I'm sure.

We think we will be re-launching the debt centre in September and we are getting the leaflets and other information ready to give to people who want money advice.

The effect of the Pandemic

foodbank has been very busy throughout the pandemic. April, May and June were the busiest when we were distributing 120 parcels a week. In May, due to the generosity of many people, we were able to feed a total of 1,303 Adults and children, In June 1,115 and July 1,063.

Looking forward

Distribution has now stabilised to around 80 to 90 parcels per week now but with the furlough scheme imminently coming to an end, sadly we are expecting a rise in foodbank guests as people find themselves in a situation where they have been made redundant.

Delivery Service

We have been offering a delivery service to those foodbank guests who are self isolating or shielding. With this period coming to an end we expect more people to now be able to pick up their own food parcel. However there will be a small number of foodbank guests who will still need us to deliver their food parcel to them.

Befriending Service

We have launched a befriending service that offers people the opportunity to talk to us and not feel alone. We want to offer comfort and someone to talk to when they need it and we will also be able to signpost foodbank guests to enable them to access the services they need.


re-opening soon

We are working towards re-opening the coffee shop on Wednesdays and Thursday's only, hopefully from the middle of August. This is dependent on getting all the necessary equipment, screening etc in place. There will be a reduced menu but we are planning to serve a hot meal on Thursdays. We will only be able to accommodate about 30 customers at any one time with social distancing.

We still have funds left for free meals, so these will be able to continue for some time to be delivered on Tuesdays and Fridays. We are assessing if there is still a need for regular hot meal deliveries in the future, when the funding runs out. It seems that there is a real need for this.

Many of our volunteers are over 70, or vulnerable adults, so we have a shortage of volunteers. Some of our regular volunteers have decided not to return and some of them have been helping with meal deliveries.

Northampton holiday club leader praises Marcus Rashford's free food voucher campaign

Food In the School Holidays was set up by Emmanuel Church in 2017 and has fed 1,800 children over the school summer holidays in Northampton

A Northampton school holiday club leader has applauded the Manchester United player Marcus Rashford for drawing attention to children who go hungry during the school holidays.

Project coordinator for Food In the School Holidays (FISH), Paul Foster, has said "it's a pleasant surprise" to see the Government make a U-turn on it's decision to extend children's free school meal vouchers for the summer holidays - but the campaign must be continued.


FISH was set up by Emmanuel Church Group and Growing Together Northampton three years ago at Blackthorn Academy where it is hosted every Tuesday in school holidays.

The groups organise one free meal for struggling families where they feed 100 hungry bellies each week, including parents and children. He said: "We always make sure that we have enough food for the parents because we know that they will skip meals to feed children so we make sure they are fed as well. Where possible we try and do a cooked meal even if it's maybe hot dogs, fish finger sandwiches, stews, soups, or pasta - something warm and filling really.

Even though it was one lunch a week we were providing it was time for parents to get out, socialise and feed the children - it was one less thing they'd have to fork out for."

It comes as England footballer Marcus Rashford has prompted a Government U-turn that will see parents claim vouchers for about 1.3 million children in England during the summer holidays. That means any family with an income of less than £7,400 before benefits will qualify for free school meal vouchers for £15 a week per child

He's done brilliantly," Paul added. "It's a pleasant surprise to see the Government do a U-turn but we have to be careful because it's only for the summer and we need to continue campaigning and speaking to the right people so it carries on for the future. During the school holidays that facility isn't there and that's why we started the club up. It's had a knock on effect to people being able to go out and have something to look forward to."




My ministry continues


God is always with us and speaks to each of us in many different ways. But how often in our daily 'busyness' and other distractions, are we really listening?


