BIG RED COMBINED HARVESTER

'Big, red combine harvester' The favourite song in so many Harvest Festival assemblies and church celebrations that I've attended over the past few years. I think the record for me was singing it in eight services in one week! So, whenever I think about this time of year, the words (and compelling rhythm) of that song haunt me, but are softened by the endearing actions of Reception and year 1 pupils singing and acting out the words.

These days, especially in towns, the celebration of ingathering of the harvest is less about thanksgiving than an outpouring of generosity as we think about those who have less than us. Tins and packets of vegetables, soup, cereals, disposable nappies, soap and toothpaste, and so much else are brought up to the front, or offered at the altar in church as our contribution to relieving the plight of those who have less than us, often nothing. Thank you for your generosity during this season, and during the past year.

This year is especially highlighted by the arrival of Afghan refugees and those from Hong Kong who look to find a place of freedom, democracy and peace in our country. Many have arrived in Northampton, and we are proud at Emmanuel Group of Churches to be part of the welcome and hospitality for them. I do hope that we will all be generous and go beyond our usual efforts to welcome and support them in their hour of need.

Recently I mentioned the plight of these two specific groups in a service I was leading in one of the local churches and lifted them in prayer to God. At the end of the service I was approached by two individuals, both with tears in their eyes. One had recently moved into the community on arrival from Hong Kong, whose neighbour had invited her to come to church. She was at great pains to tell me she didn't believe in Jesus, but had come to find conversation and company, and was moved to find that we had prayed for her people. It was for her a turning point in her life and

wanted to explore this Jesus more. The second, an Indian gentleman, had been in this country only four weeks. Again a non-believer but he had been given a Bible and was reading it through bit by bit to improve his English. He had come by chance to church for the first time. Whilst he said that he knew that prayer wasspecific to other peoples, he felt included and now understood so much more of what Jesus had been saying. Two lives transformed. Both wanted to know more and to return regularly to this church.

One of the things that always strikes me when I take group of pilgrims to the Holy Land is the way that the rhythm of seasons is so ingrained in religious observance in that land. It's no mistake that faith and the seasons of growing are part of the cycle of the country's calendar, worship and economy. Rules laid down back in the time of the Exodus for times of being thankful to God for his provision and the blessings of a fruitful harvest are honoured today. But it was also given that, with the thanksgiving, people should remember their own failure to link God's love and provision for humanity with their too frequent falling away from following his ways to live, and to ask for forgiveness. It's a salutary lesson to understand the true relationship between God and ourselves. We can micro-analyse production of our food, but we can't actually provide a drop of rain or a second of sunshine! That's beyond us, and we are dependent upon another source - God - to bless us and our work, our harvest and our generous response. So, as you sing 'Big Red Combine Harvester', perhaps for the eighth time this autumn, remember to give thanks, to ask for forgiveness for our failures and to be generous with our response to God's generosity to us.







We have seen a decrease in people visiting the unit over the last couple of months. Last month we fed 600 people compared to 1400 earlier in the year. The delivery project and the extra opening time of Friday foodbank came to an end as we came out of lockdown. Both were part of

our response to the pressures created by the pandemic. They were always emergency measures and not financially sustainable for the long term.

Food donations have increased since lockdown has ended. Fareshare are donating as much fruit and vegetables as we are able to distribute. Supermarket donations have also increased and we look forward to the Christmas supermarket collections when we will be able to promote the Food bank face to face which we haven't been able to do for some time.

For the start of a new school year we hosted our first School Uniform pop up shop in the foodbank. We helped 20 families with uniform and have guite a bit left over. We plan to host a pop up shop at the start of each term to support families and we have applied for funding to help with back packs, lunch boxes, pencil cases and stationary.

We are currently advertising for more volunteers. This has become necessary as

the furlough scheme has wound down and volunteers have gone back to work. Also students have gone back to their Universities and Colleges.

Foodbanks were established to provide food to people in an emergency situation.

We are very aware of the danger of people becoming dependant on foodbank. Whilst we will never turn away anyone who is in need, we must also take care to ensure that food banks do not become viewed as an established, 'normal' part of daily lives.

Our long term aim is to support and encourage families to regain independence by offering them advice and support to deal with any outstanding debt and make sure they are claiming all benefits for which they are entitled. In the future we would like to be in the position to offer coaching to gently move them on to achieve independence and take back control of their lives.

COP26 Climate Change:

'Today's children and teenagers will face catastrophic consequences unless we take responsibility now, as 'fellow workers with God' (Genesis 2.4-7), to sustain our world.'

- Archbishop of Canterbury, Pope Francis, and Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew

33 years after Dr James Hansen warned of the dangerous situation the world's climate was heading towards, the leaders of the three largest Christian Churches - the Roman Catholic Church, the Eastern Orthodox Church and the Anglican Communion - are demanding more urgent action.

Their statement — A joint message for the protection of creation — was published in October and was signed by Pope Francis, Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew and Archbishop Justin Welby. They urge us all to play our part in 'choosing life' for the future of the planet and called on us to pray for the world leaders attending COP26 this month. Their message begins with a summary which includes the following:

We call on everyone, whatever their belief or world view, to endeavour to listen to the cry of the earth and of people who are poor, examining their behaviour and pledging meaningful sacrifices for the sake of the earth which God has given us. Today, we are paying the price ... Tomorrow could be worse. This is a critical moment. Our children's future and the future of our common home depend on it.'

We stand before a harsh justice: biodiversity loss, environmental degradation and climate change are the inevitable consequences of our actions, since we have greedily consumed more of the earth's resources than the planet can endure. But we also face a profound injustice: the people bearing the most catastrophic consequences of these abuses are the poorest on the planet and have been the least responsible for causing them.'

The three world church leaders invite us to pray:

- For world leaders attending COP26
- For individuals: To make meaningful sacrifices for the sake of the planet, working together and taking responsibility for how we use our resources.
- For those with far-reaching responsibilities: To choose people-centred profits and lead the transition to just and sustainable economies

We also belong to the one in whom: 'all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through him and for him.' We are empowered by Christ to take our proper place as stewards of the earth, as we share in this hope. We are called to love God and neighbour, and care for the planet by living simply, recycling, conserving energy and choosing reusable options.

However great the climate crisis gets, as Christians, we can engage in it with faith and not with fatalism!

In Flanders' fields the poppies blow between the crosses, row on row, that mark our place: and in the sky the larks, still bravely singing, fly scarce heard amid the guns below.'

This is the first verse of John McCrae's poem, first published in Punch magazine in 1915. It soon came to symbolise the sacrifice of all who died in World War One. Today, the poppy remains a tangible symbol for those who have sacrificed their lives in war, especially as we remember those who died in Afghanistan. But why do we remember?

'They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore.' (Micah 4:3).

Writing 700 years before Christ, Micah spoke at the time when Samaria fell due to the aggression of Assyria. However, he prophesied a future of hope, a world where nations come together in peace rather than war. His words are fulfilled in the kingdom of God established by Jesus.

Our understanding of *peace* is more than simply the absence of conflict. It is about building relationships between people, communities and nations, founded on love and justice for all. As we remember those who died in war, we should look practically at how we can build such relationships, beginning with our own families, colleagues and neighbours.

'We will walk in the name of the Lord our God for ever and ever. (Micah 4:5).

Let's ask God's Spirit to make us people of peace, justice and compassion for today's world.

'They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them.'

Sunday Lunch is also taking off well. This happens on the Second and last Sunday of the month.



Again, you will need to book in person or by emai. Roast Dinner is £6 each or Family booking, 2 adults and 2 children £15. Puddings and drinks are charged separately. Served from 12.00 till 3.00pm.

The first time 20 people attended, we have 30 booked for the next one and already have bookings for the following one as well. Just check the next dates by asking the staff.

We have appointed a new cook, Karen, who started on 23rd August but unfortunately she is not able to stay very long so we are on the lookout to appoint a new cook.

God in the Sciences

Should We Have Faith in Science?

How do you feel about science after more than 18 months of pandemic: tired or interested, impressed or cynical – or a bit of everything? The response to COVID-19 has demonstrated how ideology or worldview are hugely influential in our interpretation and use of scientific data – and at times in the process of experimentation itself.

Should we trial a vaccine in Spain or South Africa? Is this treatment safe enough to administer to the general public? Should vaccination be made compulsory? The data doesn't tell us what to do.

So, when we are encouraged to 'trust the science' in our ongoing response to the pandemic, or in the run-up to the COP26 UN climate change conference, how can the Church respond?

The whole biblical story affirms that God is the only one in whom we can have complete faith. On the other hand, I do put a certain amount of trust in other things. I can have faith in a plane, a body of knowledge, or a person. This trust is within limits because I know that air travel involves hazards, a body of knowledge will contain some mistakes, and every ordinary human is fallible.

I trust science to some extent because it involves careful observation and measurement, collecting different kinds of evidence. Data is interpreted, and competing interpretations are tried out. We summarise our findings in general principles or mathematical equations.

Scientists keep each other accountable by looking critically at each other's work. Our knowledge is always provisional. You can't prove anything scientifically because we only deal in evidence, not proof.

On the other hand, there must always be the potential to disprove a theory or it's not science. Our aim is to keep getting nearer to the truth about the way the world is.



Overall, I believe this method is reliable and worth supporting, but that only God is completely trustworthy.

Psalm Eight reminds us both of the splendour of God's creation, and that He has placed us in a position of responsibility over it. Scientific knowledge can be part of what helps us to rule well.

The process of doing science can be a bit like a blurry image coming into focus. The more we learn, the better we can usually see what's going on, and hopefully the easier it is to decide on a course of action. So in answer to the question 'Should we have faith in science?' I would say yes, when used wisely and within its proper limits.


