HM QUEEN ELIZABETH II 1926–2022

Queen Elizabeth'S strong Christian faith was evident throughout her life in both her words and actions. As Queen she was 'Defender of the Faith and Supreme Governor of the Church of England' but apart from these official roles, her own personal faith was demonstrated even before she was crowned.

'Pray for me ... that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve Him and you, all the days of my life.'

That prayer request was made by the Queen in her first Christmas broadcast in 1952. Her father, King George VI, had died in February that year. She was crowned Queen 18 months later on 2 June 1953 at Westminster Abbey, London.

Her Christmas broadcasts to the Commonwealth were written by herself and frequently referred to Jesus Christ, whose birth is celebrated at Christmas. As she said in her Christmas broadcast in December 2000: 'For me the teachings of Christ and my own personal accountability before God provide a framework in which I try to lead my life.'

The Queen was crowned in a deeply symbolic church service devised in AD 973 included prayers and Holy Communion. The orb, sceptre, ring and crown used in the ceremony each include a cross to symbolise the rule of Jesus Christ over the world. The crown jewels are set with many of the world's most valuable gems and yet, a Bible is presented during the coronation and described as 'the most valuable thing that this world affords'.

During the Queen's long reign, she was inspired by the sacrificial life of Jesus Christ, who said of himself: he 'did not come to be served, but to serve'.

In 2008 the Queen said: 'I hope that, like me, you will be com-

forted by the example of Jesus of Nazareth who, often in circumstances of great adversity, managed to live an outgoing, unselfish and sacrificial life ... He makes it clear that genuine human happiness and satisfaction lie more in giving than receiving; more in serving than in being served.'

Her personal faith also prompts her to work for peace and reconciliation internationally and in her own family. In 2011 she said, 'Forgiveness lies at the heart of the Christian faith. It can heal broken families, it can restore friendships and it can reconcile divided communities. It is in forgiveness that we feel the power of God's love.'

In her 2012 Christmas broadcast she said 'This is the time of year when we remember that God sent his only son "to serve, not to be served". He restored love and service to the centre of our lives in the person of Jesus Christ. It is my prayer this Christmas Day that his example and teaching will continue to bring people together to give the best of themselves in the service of others. The carol, "In the Bleak Midwinter" ends by asking a question of all of us who know the Christmas story, of how God gave himself to us in humble service:

What can I give him, poor as I am?

If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb;

if I were a wise man, I would do my part...

'The carol gives the answer, 'Yet what I can I give him – give my heart'.

We give thanks for our Queen and her example of dedication, integrity and service to this country and the commonwealth. May her legacy live on in Jesus Name. Amen. Farewell to

Jesus called me over 30 years to help and give people a holiday or day trip I have made many friends and I miss those who have taken their last journey to heaven.

Possibility of visit to Jordan

Having had little opportunity to travel overseas as part of my ministry in the past few years, I am currently exploring the possibility of visiting Jordan in November to help Anne (I'm not using her actual name for security reason). I used to work with Anne until she moved to the Middle East.

Part of Anne's ministry involves supporting refugee women in the city. Several of these women have been exploring issues of faith with Anne and others in the team, and are taking steps towards discovering a personal relationship with Jesus.

Due to understandable cultural barriers, the women are reluctant to discuss faith and pray together as a group.

including: creation, creative arts, cultures and people groups, festivals, young people, hospitality, salvation, prayer, provision, and vision.

We recently held a weekend event at our centre in Llanelli to celebrate the cultures and people groups we have worked In July we had a practical workday at our centre in Llanelli, where we spent the day painting and deep cleaning our building. This was followed by a meal together. It was great to work together in a practical way with all ages, as several families joined in.

The idea is to use creative activities as a way of drawing the women together in a relaxed setting, breaking down the obstacles of fear and suspicion. We hope that one day they will support and strengthen one another as a growing faith community.

I will be teaching textile arts and crafts with simple natural dying techniques, pattern creation and silk painting.

Although the women are unable to draw or write competently with a pen or pencil, they are proficient in the art of drawing henna tattoos, and this should prove to be a useful transferable skill in the production of decorated scarves.

We Have Moved !

Sadly we have had to leave our unit in Weston Favell Centre as it has now been rented out. We would like to thank the centre management for their wonderful support over the last four years

For the time being we have made arrangements to distribute food from Emmanuel Church and are renting a storage and packing space at Moulton Park.

These arrangements are 'temporary'. We are still looking for a place which will accommodate storage, packing and foodbank itself + plus our partner agencies, in the area we serve as a church and as a foodbank.

The foodbank at WFC was closed for the week from Mon 19^{th} – Mon 27^{th} September to enable us to pack up and move; and re-opened in the ground floor room at Emmanuel on Wednesday 28th September.

We are only able to open for two days per week; Wednesday and Friday and because of this we have increased our opening time by an hour each day.

There is information about all of these changes on our facebook page and website.

To operate successfully between two sites we needed a van but had no idea how we would be able to afford it. The cost of renting one was unsustainable.

Daily Bread' generously offered use of their van initially. But O'Riordan Bond have offered us the free use of a van for one year which is an amazing answer to prayer!

Stats for Aug 2022.

You will note an increase of 19% since last month.

This is the highest number of guests we've fed this year in any one month.

The West Northampton council project rollout of the household support fund of £100 food vouchers may have influenced the increase, as many of these guests were new to the food bank. Aug 22 - 1485

Aug 21 = 564

June 22 = 1379

July 21 = 1059

There was a big increase in our food spending budget last month, we are hoping this will reduce for September as we were closed to the public between 19th - 26th September, whilst the move was taking place.

We gradually allowed our stocks to shrink in the run up to the move so we urgently need food donations at this time.

We realise that the rising cost of living is impacting on everyone and so foodbank is extremely grateful to people continuing to donate, enabling us to continue to feed those in need. at.

Throughout an exceptionally long life of public service, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth frequently said "Thank You" and "Well done" on our behalf to countless deserving people. On the sad news of her death, we now have an opportunity to say "Thank you" and "Well done" most deservedly to her.

In doing so, I believe we will be joining our words to those of Christ, quoted in the old Prayer Book funeral service; "Well done thou good and faithful servant, enter now into thy rest".

I was deeply moved by our late Queen's Platinum Jubilee letter signed simply "Your servant Elizabeth". Someone once called her "the servant Queen following the Servant King" and this was most evident in her annual Christmas broadcasts.

In the days since Her Majesty's death I have been reminded of the lovely General Thanksgiving prayer which I have discovered was written by a former Rector of All Saints Church in Northampton, Edward Reynolds (1599 -1676). He based it upon an earlier private prayer of the first Queen Elizabeth. As I reflected on this beautiful prayer, I was filled with gratitude for God's goodness in ordinary life ("creation, preservation and all the blessings of this life"), spiritual life ("inestimable love in the redemption of the world"), eternal life ("the hope of glory"). It pleads for unfeigned thankfulness to be lived out in deeds not just words ("giving up ourselves to thy service") and for faithful life-long goodness ("holiness and righteousness all our days").

The more I read the prayer, the more it described our late Queen, humble gratefulness leading to life-long servanthearted faithfulness. It is printed below so you may use it in your thankful reflection upon her.

Frontline Sundays Sermon Series

I pray that you will be inspired as we walk through this series together, to engage in everyday mission and share the Gospel.

Peter Greg, the founder of the 24/7 movement made a few comments regarding

the Queens funeral, which I would like to share with you, to give you encouragement in everyday mission and reflecting his love at this time

of instability.

Pete Greg said that the Queens funeral was a globally significant event, where the world was gathered around a Christian ceremony of

prayer and worship, at which the gospel was preached. It was also the biggest gathering of world leaders in recent times.

Reporting on the Queen's funeral included more positive comments on the Queen's faith -

Christianity, than there has been for a long time. This should give us some confidence in sharing God's good news today!

Pete Greg further reflects on Isaiah chapter 6, where he received his commission from God the year the King died. The Kings death was a

marker spiritually. The King had been on the throne for fifty two years and during this time there was stability, familiarity, peace.

The King's death would have created instability. Yet it is amidst the King's death and cultural chaos that Isaiah is commissioned and sent

out, Isaiah had a moment of clarity and saw the King of King's.

The Harvest fields are ripe, let us be harvest hands and pray for more. Let us share in the

commissioning of God's people and pray that people would have clarity at this time and see the King of Kings!
