#### It has been announced that the next Bishop of Peterborough will be the Right Reverend Debbie Sellin.

Bishop Debbie, currently Bishop of Southampton, will be

installed at a service in Peterborough Cathedral in early 2024

Debbie's commitment to faith developed at a Crusaders youth group. She started full-time ministry as a Children and Families Worker.

Debbie was brought up in a rectory surrounded by church life, but a clear calling to ordained ministry came later in



life, being drawn initially to work in a caring profession which resulted in a career in NHS Management.

It was whilst Bishop Debbie was caring for her own young family that she felt a definite call to ministry which deepened over time, leading her to begin her ordination training in 2004. Whilst serving in parish ministry she also took on the additional role of Area Dean, something that gave her a wider perspective and introduced her to the workings of the Diocese. From these roles, she was appointed Bishop of Southampton, something she describes as 'exciting and daunting at the same time', but felt 'a deep sense that this was what God wanted for me that only grew stronger and stronger'.

During her time as Bishop of Southampton, Bishop Debbie has been involved in a variety of roles. As non-executive chair of Love Southampton, her passion for seeing social transformation through ecumenical outreach and community engagement was enhanced. She has also been an Ambassador of the Rose Road Association which provides direct care for children and young adults with complex physical and learning disabilities and support for their families.

The role of Diocesan Bishop is not completely new to Bishop Debbie who has been the acting Bishop of Winchester following the retirement of Bishop Tim Dakin in February 2022. In an unsettled environment, Bishop Debbie spent time listening and understanding the challenges that people were facing, whilst working towards building reconciliation and unity.

One of Bishop Debbie's priorities has been to encourage parishes to thrive. In her current diocese there is a rich variety of land-scapes from urban to very rural, coastal and the new forest and she is dedicated to helping parishes in all these different contexts be the best they can be; guiding them through vacancies, celebrating those who are flourishing and coming alongside those who would welcome additional support.

Welcoming Bishop Debbie to her new role, John Holbrook, Bishop of Brixworth said; 'I am thrilled that Debbie has agreed to serve as the next Bishop of Peterborough. She has great experience of bringing unity and identity to a large and diverse diocese, a heart to champion young people and support those at the margins of society and a mission to see our parishes and their communities thrive'.

Debbie is married to Paul, a Professor of Physics, and has two grown-up sons. In her rare downtime she enjoys cooking, reading and craft, spending time with family and taking coastal walks.

Good news! You don't need to go to Jerusalem to celebrate the most joyous Jewish feast, the Feast of Tabernacles (also known as Sukkot)!


Join us in St Giles church room on St Giles Terrace, NN1 2BN, for a time of light refreshments, worship, celebration and teaching.

### The Poppies of Remembrance Sunday



In late 1914, WW1 erupted across Northern France and Flanders. Great swathes of previously green fields and forests were blasted and bombed, leaving them bleak and barren, with seemingly every living thing destroyed.

But then in the Spring of 1915, something beautiful began to come out of all the destruction. Tens of thousands of bright red Flanders poppies began to put out tentative shoots across the endless vistas of mud. These resilient little flowers had actually flourished in the middle of so much chaos and destruction, because their seeds grow when exposed to sunlight, through disturbances to soil.

We all know that these endless fields of cheerful poppies, growing in the midst of such misery and destruction, were what inspired the Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, to write the now famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'.

And it was McCrae's poem which inspired an American academic named Moina Michael to adopt the poppy in memory of those who had fallen in the war. She got it adopted as an official symbol of Remembrance across the United States, and worked with others who were trying to do the same in Canada, Australia, and the UK.

A French woman, Anna Guérin who was in the UK in 1921, caught the same vision, and planned to sell the poppies in London. There she met Earl Haig, the founder of the Royal British Legion, who was persuaded to adopt the poppy as its emblem in the UK.

The Royal British Legion, which had been formed in 1921, ordered nine million poppies and sold them on 11 November that year. Ever since then, the red poppy has been a symbol of Remembrance, of support for the Armed Forces community, and also of hope for a peaceful future.





#### Turn it off!

Energy conservation is one of the most important things you can do to reduce your carbon footprint. Leaving your electricals on standby uses unnecessary energy – turn them off at the wall when you've finished using them, and you could see your bill going down too.

#### Invest in eco - friendly technology

Want to go further than simply turning it off? If you need to get new appliances, check their energy-efficiency rating to ensure they're as efficient as possible. This way, you're using much less energy for the time that the product is on and reducing your energy output. And if you're looking to make bigger changes at home to cut your carbon footprint – have you considered heating your home with an air source heat pump, or installing solar panels on your rooftop so that you can generate your own electricity?

#### Switch to renewables

Choosing 100% renewable electricity is a great eco-friendly tip for any home – and is one of the biggest things you can do to help tackle the climate crisis. Due to the current situation in the energy market, it's best to stay with your existing supplier right now. But think about doing it when switching supplier opens up again.

#### **Eat Less Meat**

Being careful with what you're consuming is at the heart of being more environmentally friendly, and cutting down on the amount of meat you eat can have a huge impact. Not having red meat and eating a more plant based diet – even if it's just for two or three days a week – can have quite a significant impact on reducing your carbon footprint.

#### **Don't Waste Food**

Waste not, want not. Did you know that 9.5 million tonnes of food is wasted in the UK every year? This isn't just a huge waste of food and money, it adds to the amount of CO2 and methane being created in landfills.

#### **Recycle Everything**

Chances are that if you're pursuing a more eco-friendly lifestyle then you'll already be recycling. But could you improve your recycling-ability (now a word)? You can recycle almost everything, from batteries to paper to crisp packets to cars. Before you throw it away, take a minute to find out if you could recycle it instead.

#### Compost

If your food as gone too far beyond its 'best by' date then you could compost it rather than putting it in the bin. Not only will this help create a natural fertiliser and keep your garden green, it'll also reduce the amount of waste going to landfill — and as it won't break down anaerobically, there will not be a build-up of methane gas. If you can't compost at home, you could find out if there are any local compost schemes available, or if your local authority collects food waste alongside other recycling. Make sure to only compost organic waste to avoid unwanted pests.

#### Try to cut out plastic

Plastic seems to have found its way into every single aspect of our lives. However, giving it up isn't as difficult as you might think – bring a canvas bag with you when you go shopping, buy your fruit and veg loose and stop buying bottled water. There are also more and more shops around where you can bring your own container for things like nuts, seeds, pasta, oats and more – plus get refills for soap, shampoo, washing up liquid and laundry detergent.

#### **Use LED light bulbs**

Not only do LED light bulbs last longer than conventional bulbs, they're far more efficient too! This means that you'll be using less power and having to replace your light bulbs less frequently – everyone's a winner. What's more, they're available in a range of brightness and designs so you can really tailor the lighting to your needs or to suit the room.

#### **Insulate your home**

Homes that aren't well insulated are much harder to keep warm when it's cold, and cool when the weather is hot. Find out more about insulating your home, including benefits, costs and savings you would see in your bills. You may be surprised.




