June sees the beginning a new Sermon series: What is the Church? and What is it for?

I'm sure you can come up with many different answers to those questions and there are indeed many answers to them. Over the next few months we will be exploring the image and role of the church and it's message in and to society, which is of course a wide and multidimensional topic.

Why? you may wonder. Many churches in the U.K are in decline, and it is suggested that many have simply not adapted to the changes in society. Simply put, many churches have carried on trying to do the same thing knowing that it is not having the impact it used to. But what does a healthy church look like? Are numbers everything? How can the church survive in a multicultural, increasingly skeptical and secular society?

I am excited about exploring different approaches and answers to these questions. This is because I am convinced that the Church is God's chosen instrument to be beacons of His light in our communities. Principally the church exists because God has ordained her to be his hands and feet in the world, to a mouthpiece of righteousness to point people into God's Kingdom. This is by no mean feat and is not an easy calling. The Church without God is dead. A church that is not fired up for the gospel is no better, and a church that is resource rich is not necessarily at more of an advantage either.

The Church is not perfect, the concept is, because God is.

But as people we are fallible. There are many analogies for this such as as: 'The church is one beggar telling another where they can find bread' or 'If you find the perfect church, you can't attend because you will spoil it.' The truth of the church is that we are collection of fallen people gathered together to celebrate the God of redemption and forgiveness.

So, yes the word church can mean different things for different people, it can also mean different things at different times. When I 'returned to church' in 1999 (Culloden Baptist) I was going through a rough time in my life. A member of the diaconate (leader) said to me that Sunday to Sunday can be a long time, why not join a small group. I did and that helped to firm my foundation in Christ and grow in faith once again. The point here is that Church is not just something we do or go to get something out of, Church is part of our identity in Jesus Christ and in being church we respond to and with God in our lives.

It truly is our prayer that as we approach this series we come afresh to the question of what it means to be 'church' and hear something of what God may be calling us to, as we seek to be guided and empowered by the Holy Spirit together, so that we can celebrate what was, be grateful for what is and dare to hope and pray for the times to come.

We all love to have beautiful green gardensbut it's important to think about how we can garden responsibly to save water, protect our environment, enhance local wildlife and to make sure we have enough for future generations.

As we approach (hopefully) warmer weather, most people are excited to spend more time outdoors. Here are some water-saving tips to help save every drop in our gardens and allotments.

Long grass gives shade to the soil and stops it getting too dry – and can encourage wildflowers to grow, creating a haven for pollinators in the garden. In dry weather, water young plants and vegetables first and leave your other older plants to wait a little longer.


Collecting rainwater in a water butt can fill up a watering can 27 times for free. Use a water butt or even a bucket to collect rain to use in dry spells. You don't need a water butt to start collecting rainwater. You can simply use an old bucket, bin or container you likely already have at home. If you use a plastic container, you'll also be giving the plastic a new lease of life and preventing it from heading to landfill.

Be sure to weed regularly .Weeds compete with your plants for water and nutrients. Adding mulch, wood chip or bark to your garden beds allows the rain to penetrate through whilst minimising the amount of water lost due to evaporation - it also helps to keep weeds out.

Something special happens when lots of Christians gather together and I love the fact the Butlins staff see that and are blessed by our presence. Spring Harvest makes sure there is something for everyone with activities from 7.30 in the morning till 11 at night

At a Christian Conference you would expect there to be some good teaching and there definitely is, for all ages and stages of faith. My day started at 9am with a 1980's



workout video themed all age service, with drama, music and teaching. The service set the theme for each day based on the book of Ephesians.

Then I went to bible study where we dug further into Ephesians, the quality of the teaching is excellent.

Next I manage to grab a quick coffee to take to a seminar on Mental Health, before heading back to the chalet for lunch.

Alternative choices included an Alpha course, more bible teaching, or attending one of a choice of seminars. Children have their own groups, where they have teaching, worship and fun with games and crafts alongside hundreds of other children and young people.



For me the afternoon was time to explore Butlins and the beach but there were teaching sessions, workshops, seminars and shows I could have gone to. I did end up at a praise party one afternoon, with my friend's daughter, It turned out to be the most energetic work out I have had in months!

This year after dinner I chose to go to the smaller acoustic venue for the evening meeting, but I could have gone to Studio 36 to hear the likes of Pete Greig. My smaller venue had some amazing teaching from people like Phil Knox and Debra Green and it was announced that our venue would be a church for the week, and it was, with great worship times, a prayer team and a creative space. A chance to be refreshed and refilled and blessed.

But that wasn't the end of the day, with shows, worship music and Christian comedy to choose from. Andy Kind and Tim Vine were two highlights of my week. For me, the thing about Spring Harvest is I don't just go to church every day. I do life in a Christian space for 5 days. From learning and worshipping, to talking about how to deal with the ups and downs of life, to just having a laugh with other Christians. (and there's always the beach). **Krissy Cressie**



I have been going to Spring Harvest for almost 40 years now. Firstly when my daughters were young when they would go off to their various groups; never to be seen except at meal times.

I remember well the songs taught to them by Ishmael (who remembers him) and "The Glorie Company". They would sing in the car all the way home and for some weeks afterwards. In fact especially when we are there, even now Wendy occasionally bursts in to these catchy ditties. Spring Harvest has this effect . It stays with you for weeks if not years afterwards. We attended the first of these (don't ask why). All the seminars are optional and should you prefer a walk along the beach or promenade this too could be very spiritually uplifting as well as healthy. Speaking of health there is an organised run every morning and a swimming pool and Ice Rink on site, not to mention Butlins Funfair as a bit of light relief.

In the mornings there are Bible study and teaching sessions and every evening wonderful uplifting Celebrations in a variety of venues according to your preferences. The choice is yours and there are Alpha groups too for those still searching.

I really must not forget to mention the after-hours entertainment which included comedian Tim Vine who was so hilarious we went to his show two nights running.

I love it and will be going again in 2025 God willing. The question is will it be just me and Wendy again or can we tempt some of you to join us?

The wonderful world of Ladybird books


I'm really excited about a new exhibition running at my local museum this summer. It promises to prompt joyful memories of childhood for many older people – and maybe remind them of when they first learnt about Jesus.

'The Wonderful World of the Ladybird Artists' aims to "uncover the story of the talented artists who illustrated Ladybird books for more than 30 years." It's a fascinating exhibition that has already been staged in cities from Canterbury to Northumberland and is at the St Albans Museum until 8th September.

The organisers say: "This colourful, family-friendly exhibition includes rare books, original artwork and artefacts, and reveals how illustrators played such an enormous role in Ladybird's extraordinary success."

Ladybird Books also played a vital role in thousands of Sunday Schools and churches in the UK and many other Englishspeaking countries from the 1940s until well into the 1970s.

For many children and young people, these books were their first introduction to the Bible, with numerous parents, grand-




parents and carers reading them as bedtime stories. 'Easy Reading' versions helped many children read about Jesus for themselves. I've been collecting some of the Bible-based copies of the Ladybird books from local charity shops, with titles such as 'Stories about Jesus the Helper,' 'Children of the Bible' and 'Two Stories Jesus Told,' featuring the classic parables, the Good

Samaritan and The Prodigal Son. I've been struck by the faithful retelling of the Bible stories, and the quality of the illustrations.

These colourful books were a staple of many Scripture classes and Sunday School prize-giving and helped form the Biblical

understanding of a generation of children. Today, the books have become very collectible, with prices on the rise.

Ladybird books were, naturally, a product of their times with, for example, the skin tones of Jesus and the apostles often lighter than what reality might have been. The books were produced for a time when Bible stories were more



widely known, and families were routinely depicted as mum, dad, a son and a daughter.

In recent years, more bizarre incarnations of Ladybird Books – such as 'The Ladybird Book of the Zombie Apocalypse' – have introduced new audiences to the Ladybird style, with an ironic, comic twist.

Personally, I much prefer the originals!

Father's Day

In the UK, USA and Canada, the third Sunday in June is Father's Day. It's usually a good time for sons and daughters to take their father to his favourite restaurant, or to watch a favoured sport, or whatever else he enjoys doing. How will you celebrate it this year? If your own father cannot be with you, how about a Zoom meeting?

How do these special days ever get started, anyway? Well, Father's Day began because way back in 1909 there was a woman in Spokane, Washington, named Sonora Louise Smart Dodd. That year she heard a church sermon about the merits of setting aside a day to honour one's mother. Mother's Day was just beginning to gather widespread attention in the United States at this time. But Sonora Louise Smart Dodd knew that it was her father who had selflessly raised herself and her five siblings by himself after their mother had died in childbirth. So the sermon on mothers gave Sonora Louise the idea to petition for a day to honour fathers, and in particular, her own father, William Jackson Smart.


Sonora Louise soon set about planning the first Father's Day celebration in Spokane in 1910. With support from the Spokane Ministerial Association and the YMCA, her efforts paid off, and a 'Father's Day' was appointed. Sonora Louise had wanted Father's Day to be on the first Sunday in June (since that was her father's birthday), but the city council didn't have time to approve it until later in the month. And so on June 19th, 1910, the first Father's Day was celebrated in Spokane.

Gradually, other people in other cities caught on and started celebrating their fathers, too. The rose was selected as the official Father's Day flower. Some people began to wear a white rose to honour a father who was dead, and a red one to honour a father who was living. Finally, in 1972, President Richard Nixon signed a presidential proclamation declaring the third Sunday of June as Father's Day – a permanent, national holiday.




Monday Night Prayer

We thank you for all of our clergy and leaders.



This summer, why not encourage your children to read a book? A study has found that children who read for pleasure carry the benefits with them far into adulthood.

And the most avid childhood readers score far higher on vocabulary tests, even 30 years later.

Marcel Proust the author once said there are "no days of our childhood lived so fully as those spent with a favourite book."

Bored is good

This will cheer you up this summer when your children mope around the house saying that they are bored: apparently a bit of boredom is good for them. A senior educationalist, Julia Robinson, encourages parents Not to force their children into too many activities. Instead, they should be allowed to become bored, so that they can have time to be reflective and calm.

Too many pursuits such as music lessons, sport and online learning could result in a generation of manic, anxietyridden adults, she warns. She points out that happiness does not come from a "regime of unrealistic multitasking, running oneself ragged with an exhausting programme of endless...activities."

Another educationalist urged that children need "downtime" Allow them to be bored, to give them the stimulus to be inventive, resourceful and self-reliant – all important life skills."
