God can do "immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine"

Ephesians 3:20

When we give over ourselves to God, surprising and powerful things can happen. I used to teach English as a foreign language here in the UK. Young students would make plans to travel and do some activities during their stay. And something I'd often hear during the summer was: the weather's horrible this week, let's wait. I said to them, "this is the UK, the weather can be really mixeddon't hold off, just embrace it, and enjoy whatever you plan to do". They said afterwards that was the best advice. Some of the best things can happen when we let go and stop trying to take control.

In John 20, Jesus commissioned the disciples. They are to work for Jesus, to be filled with God's breath, and sent out into the world as Jesus had been. Interestingly, Peter decides to go fishing. Peter had denied Jesus three times. He probably felt the great commission wasn't meant for him. He felt that he had failed Jesus.

It's as if the disciples, faced with this huge task of immense importance and expectation, they feel a bit overwhelmed - Well, what do we do now? - Where do we start? and they decide to do something they knew, something calming, in their comfort zone.

I think we can all understand something of this- we might have a deadline and we don't feel equipped to even start on the project, we think well, "what do I do, how do I make a start?" So, we have a cup of tea, then we declutter and take the dog for a walk.

In this, we sometimes forget that Jesus is there to help. Like Peter, we forget to go to him and seek his peace, his wisdom and will. We try to do things our own way. The disciples will try to fish all night and catch nothing. The water has been Peter's workplace, and he feels like a failure here too.

Maybe you have been working on some projects and you've been getting nowhere and wondering why this might be. We can try to seek Jesus, be with Jesus and listen to his voice.

The only way is for the disciples to admit defeat, to listen to Jesus' voice, and to do what he says, in surrender. Then there is no knowing what they will achieve. This goes for us too.

Let's intentionally practice the holy habit of asking Jesus, on a regular basis, where he thinks we should fish - what Jesus thinks we should do. When we do this and yield to his will, through his mighty power at work within us, he can accomplish infinitely more than we might ask or think. We are going to get it wrong at times, but Jesus has a way of meeting us where we are and leading us to where he wants us to be, just like he meets with Peter and then restores him, forgives him. In following Jesus, he might close some doors for others to open. There may be what feels like setbacks before flourishing. God may in his wisdom, take us on a journey. Stepping out of our comfort zones in faith, handing over ourselves, outcomes and situations to God can be hard. It means vulnerably accepting and inviting whatever then comes our way, in trust.

We need to trust that he is with us, amidst our struggles, moving for good. Let's be encouraged to keep on pausing and returning to him, surrendering to him. He will lead us, through the power of the Holy Spirit. The disciples do stop and listen to Jesus. He encourages and helps them fish. He comes alongside them and gracefully and generously breathes his life into their efforts.

When we work with Jesus, he can bring abundant results. 153 fish is a huge catch, far more than they needed or expected.

Submitting ourselves to God can lead to him doing far more than we could ever imagine or guess or request in our wildest dreams! And Jesus can take the fruit of what we humbly and vulnerably offer, just as he took those fish, and use it. We can gather around the breakfast campfire with Jesus and enjoy the harvest of his grace in our offering.

We may be able to relate to Peter in his feeling of initial failure. We might doubt ourselves and our offerings. Jesus wants us to know we are loved and valued.

He meets us where we are, and he makes things possible- he grows the fruit of our efforts. Let's look for Him in our lives, and listen for His words, in whatever form they come. He stands on the shore, calling to us, telling us where to find our daily bread: in Him.

This summer, Jesus stands on the shore with a fire of coals and some fish laid on the fire, and some bread. And He's inviting us to come and eat with Him, that we may have strength and life again, to start again over and over, to look for signs of life, to pick ourselves up and start again, over and over, until new life flourishes in all the places we've come to expect death. God welcomes our contributions, and he creates a harvest.

Jesus invites us to join in with what he's doing. He invites us to participate in the world- restoration, building on sparks of resurrection life in our communities. It's easy to think we have got to do it all. Organise ourselves, tell people the good news, change the world. But God made the sun rise. His breath guided us to think, pray, love and hope. The Spirit is on the move, blowing this way and that. When we surrender our hearts and minds to his will, and offer what we have, the Spirit meets us and equips us.



"Turn your eyes upon Jesus; look full in His wonderful face. And the things of earth will grow strangely dim, in the light of His glory and grace."


Jesus promised us: "Surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age".

The Gifts that God gives us

At the beginning of every Sunday over the past few months, at Rectory Farm we ask. "What had God been doing for you this week"? There are some interesting answers, from giving thanks for financial provision, a conversation with a colleague, good weather, recovery from illness, safe journeys and travel or unexpected blessings.

So one theme from "What is the Church", has focused on a United Community. The reading from 1 Corinthians 12: 12-31 looked at diversity and unity in the gifts of the Spirit, which are given by God to the whole church to benefit all of us. Paul gives the illustration of the Body working in harmony, to build one another up in faith and unity. In verse 28 there are specific gifts given by the Holy Spirit to the church.

The Message version listed Apostles, Prophets, Teachers, Miracle workers, Healers, Helpers, Organisers and those who pray in tongues. The Living Bible says instead of Organisers "Those who can get others to work together

As part of the service, I asked those who were there to write down, on cut out shapes of people, the gifts they felt the church has (I asked for not just spiritual gifts but to include other gifts as well). And, having done that, to write down the gifts that we did not appear to have in the church community on a piece of paper, and then to stick them on the Church outline as shown below.



The variety of gifts listed were: observing, encouragement, administration, hospitality, speaking the word, praying,

intercession, bakers, cooks, chefs, teaching, being helpful. Those we felt were missing were, healing, miracles (x 3), praying in tongues, prophesy (x3) peacemakers, visionaries. At the end of the service, we prayed over the themes and asked God to provide these gifts.

The next evening at the Monday prayer group, someone shared with us, that the week before they had been asked to pray for someone in hospital, as the prognosis was not hopeful. A few people prayed and within a few days the individual had recovered well. The Dr described it as a "miracle". The power of prayer is great indeed.

That took my thoughts back to I the story I had shared at the beginning of the previous day's service in answer to the question "What had God been doing for us this week"?


I had been "prompted in thought" to go and visit my aunt who is in a care home and, due to a family disagreement, I have not seen for 25 years. During the visit my aunt was asleep and we didn't want to wake her. However, her social worker arrived to see her and woke her. My aunt recognised me and we talked for over half an hour.

Thinking about this later in the evening. Was that not a miracle in itself and a God - incidence together? So the question is, how do we know each other's gifting? How do we grow to become the body of Christ? How can we share the gifts God gifted us with?

Perhaps like Krissy and Pat who shared their Spring Harvest holiday, or sitting with a cup of coffee and having a chat; being part of a house group; praying for each other?

I think there will be an opportunity in September, when we are going to get together and share as the Emmanuel group. So let's take the opportunity now, to pray over what gifts we have, what we want to share and what we can offer to the Body of Christ.



Continue to pray for protection for the patrols out on Saturday nights and give thanks for the Prayer Pastors who support them so faithfully.


