
Embracing every Season.

We can embrace each season with faith knowing that God is in every moment, whether joyous or challenging and he is part of a perfect plan for us.

In every season the key is to remain rooted in Christ and feed on the fruits of the harvest. Jesus said, "I came that they might have life and have it abundantly"

May we embrace the adventure of the seasons and live as people who are invited to receive all that a gracious and ever-loving God is pouring upon us, trusting in his love and in his faithfulness. Isaiah 40:8 "The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God endures forever." As we do, we will see that just as the natural seasons change, so too will our circumstances, always leading us closer to the heart of God, and to his eternal purposes.


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






We have been enjoying the sermon series related to 'What is Church?'

Turn, Turn, Turn

Back in the 1960's, my Saturday afternoons were often spent with a couple of school friends, listening to the current hit records of the day.

We played the latest songs by the Searchers, Hollies, Beach Boys and Roy Orbison (amongst others), while enacting our own version of "Juke Box Jury"!

One record that we seemed to play quite a lot was by an American group, The Byrds, and it eventually reached the dizzy heights of number 26 in the UK charts of October 1965. "So what has this to do with the Bible", I hear you ask.

Back then, single records were made of vinyl and spun on a turntable at 45 revolutions per minute. Labels were stuck in the centre, showing the name of the song and the record company, as well as details of the composers and performers. What struck me about this particular label was that, just below the name of the song, was printed, "Words from the Book of Ecclesiastes".

When I returned home, I checked the passage in my King James Bible and sure enough, apart from a couple of lines and a few slight changes to fit the metre of the tune, the lyrics were virtually identical to the passage in my Bible.

The song was "Turn! Turn!" and the writer who adapted the Bible passage was the American folk-singer and songwriter, Pete Seeger. Since the Byrds took it into the charts, the song has been recorded by many other artists over the years, but for me the definitive version will always be the recording by the Byrds, with Roger McGuinn's jangly guitar sound, that resonated around my friend's front room all those years ago.

Reading the Bible passage many times over has made me realise that God does have a plan for our lives and that "To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under heaven."



Unlearning

'My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge' (Hosea 4:6 NKJV)

Failing to unlearn irrational fears and misconceptions keeps us from becoming who God wants us to be. The invalid man in John 5 is a great example of this. He had been disabled for 38 years when Jesus asked if he would like to get well. However, the man believed there was only one way to be healed: 'I have no man to put me in the pool when the water is stirred up; but while I am coming, another steps down before me' (John 5:7 NKJV). This man assumed something that may have cost him 38 years! He thought that, in order to be healed, he had to be the first person into the pool of Bethesda when an angel stirred the water. In a sense, he was imprisoned by that thought. But Jesus uninstalled that inaccurate belief with one sentence: 'Take up your bed and walk' (v. 11 NKJV). Jesus set this man free physically, and he set him free cognitively. Faith is unlearning the senseless worries and misguided beliefs that keep us captive. And that's what we do while we study Scripture. We literally upgrade our minds by a download of the mind of Christ (see 1 Corinthians 2:16). Unlearning something is twice as hard as learning it. Why? Because every mile you go in the wrong direction is really a two-mile error as you have to double back to get to where you need to be. Getting old thoughts out of your mind is harder than getting new thoughts into it. But it's worth it. So, take time each day to renew your mind with God's Word.

The Children's Table

On all but the 2nd Sunday of the month we have a children's table at Emmanuel. This is a volunteer run provision, always happy to accept new volunteers. On the table is at least one activity that ties into the service. Often but not always, the activity is creative. There are plain paper, pens and pencils that the children can use as they choose and sometimes Lego or other construction actives, flags or instruments. You might ask why we have a children's table? How are decisions made over what happens at it? What have we done recently? What are we doing next?

In a time of limited resources, the children's table is allowing children's work to continue and by being within the service the children remain part of the main congregation. This was well demonstrated in our last series. Can you remember what we talked about in our community series? Or like me can you not remember all those carefully planned titles? If not, don't worry, the children have created a mural to remind you.



The printed eyes, speech bubbles and hearts show we care by seeing, responding and speaking out. The hands show we encourage, reaching out to bless others. The sunbeams show we are holy, shining out and reflecting God's holiness. The items at the bottom of the cross, are left there to show we

worship by giving to God even when it is tough.

The pink paper chains show we gather, supporting each other and others and sharing our faith. The cups remind us that God shines through our brokenness, when we let Him. The repaired hearts remind us that we forgive each other as we have been forgiven. The scrolls are there because we learn together from the bible. The border shows that we are creative, inspired by God's creation. The crowns demonstrate we are a Kingdom community and finally the paper planes complete the mural as we are a sent community taking Jesus' story to others outside of Emmanuel.

So, what is next? Out new series is about Holy Habits and on the children's table we will be thinking about building those habits, so each week the children will have the opportunity to complete a journal page, make a Taylor Swift style bracelet with the Habit name on and take on a building challenge like cup stacking or spaghetti towers to reinforce the idea that we are putting habits together as we explore and grow our faith.

Running the Amazing Northampton Half Marathon

Have you ever made a decision to do something and not know where to start? Well, that was me at the beginning of 2024.

The back story to me running the Amazing Northampton Half Marathon is that our daughter, Sarah, had a charity place to run the London Marathon and in true "mum support mode" I said I would support her by training with her... Little did I know the time, effort and mind-set that was required to run a marathon?



We head out on dark nights in the wind, rain and cold, plodding the roads around where we lived. I learnt to "Fuel up" that is eating while running to keep energy levels up and drink water, which was difficult as I can't drink and walk at the same time, let alone drink and run! We bought trainers to prevent knee injuries, good socks to prevent blisters and the like and went out when I really did not feel like running.

Sarah successfully ran the London Marathon in 5hours 23 mins; an epic effort. But this left me thinking, I've done all this training, what am I going to do with it?

I could have done nothing, however for my 65th birthday year I had set myself a target to do 65 new things, and so, you've guessed it, as I've never run a Half Marathon - I signed up!

I got a coach to give me some hints and tips.
I ran when I was meant to run and got up early to avoid the heat, which I struggle with.
I enjoyed the scenery, the birds singing and the sunshine.



I prayed for people as I ran; I talked to God about situations that were troubling me and I learnt to pace myself for the long run. Running 5k, (3.1 miles) is very different to running 21 k (13.5 miles)

My legs did not like some of the long distances, my hip was not always happy, so physio and sports massage appointments were required.

Two weeks before the run, I decided to raise funds for the Cynthia Spencer Hospice Charity, as there were news stories of funding issues.

Mike Maddocks, Cathy Rogers, and my friend's husband have all died from cancer this year and the support that hospices give to patients, families and friends is phenomenal.

The day of the run dawned, it wasn't going to be too hot - good! And I had done all the preparation work. The run ask for the runners to donate their jackets, hoodies etc. for the Hope Centre as well, so it truly is a local charity fundraising event.

The bands, marshals, people cheering, Haribo sweets, and caffeine gels all helped me along. By the time I hit Derngate (which is a hill) I wanted to walk, but Sarah made me run. Up Spencer Parade, another hill, into the final run along St Giles Street to the finish where some of my gym buddies had stayed behind to cheer me and Sarah in, what a joy. Hurray!

What I have learnt, which can also help with a spiritual perspective

- 1. Try something new, whatever your age.
- 2. Movement is a privilege (My gym owner says this all the time).
- 3. If I don't know how to do something ask someone who does.
- 4. Get someone to join you, its better when more than one joins in.
- 5. Keep going, when you don't feel like keeping going, you will get there.
- 6. Do something for someone less fortunate to give you additional motivation.
- 7. I raised £260 for Cynthia Spencer Hospice. A great sum.

Café Emm

We are open 10.00 - 2.00 Monday to Friday.

Café Emm continues to give a warm welcome to all who come in, whether it be for a hot dinner or just a cup of coffee and a rest and a chat.

We continue to have our regular 'Special hot dinners' on Tuesdays and Thursdays and these remain very popular with our customers, especially those who live alone.



They cost £8.80 for two courses, or £6.50 for a main course. Freshly cooked dinners are served between 12.00 and 1.45. by our friendly cooks and volunteers. We also have Sunday Lunches from time to time. These have to be booked. Ask one of the staff in the cafe for forthcoming dates and prices.

Our community café is a charity, doing discrete but important work in supporting people with learning difficulties, dementia, financial difficulties and loneliness.

The Coffee shop also provides hot food for F.I.S.H. (Fun & Food in School Holidays) This takes place at Blackthorn on Mondays and Rectory Farm on Tuesdays in school holidays. We provide 50+ children with a hot nutritious meal each time.




Monday Night Prayer




