HOW does your garden grow?

In our family you never quite know what topic of conversation will come up next. Recently we were sitting eating together and managed to get onto 'Nursery Rhymes'. This caused me to reflect on the sad fall from grace experienced by 'Jack and Jill', the cracking mess 'Humpty Dumpty' ended up in, and the unfortunate facial remodeling of the maid by the beak of the vengeful blackbird in 'Sing a song of sixpence.'

What got us started down this path? - gardening. Joanna loves

painting stones and leaving them in the garden, my mother used to collect seashells and paint them. Perhaps you have now guessed where I am going! Mary, Mary quite contrary.

The oldest known version was first published in 'Tommy Thumb's Pretty Song Book' (1744) with lyrics that are a little different to the popular later version, here is the 'original': Mistress Mary, quite contrary, How does your garden grow? With Silver Bells, And Cockle Shells, And so my garden grows.

How does your garden grow? I know some of you have beautiful flower beds, carefully and lovingly pruned shrubs, wonderfully productive vegetable gardens and meticulously manicured lawns. We, on the other hand, are more functional gardeners. I mow the lawns, trim the bushes and Zoe plants and cares for flowers, this is all done with passion rather than with a great deal of skill.

Gardening and agricultural references are common themes in the Bible. We

have the garden of Eden and many metaphors about sheep, vineyards, fig trees and seeds, soils and weeds. We often use language of growing and growth as part of our Christian discipleship and inevitability in looking at the congregation size.

Taking that last one first, congregation size can be important, it can also show us trends and factual figures of attendance. What it doesn't show is depth of discipleship - how each person is indeed growing in their Christian faith. Neither does it show the depth of the inner work of the Holy Spirit. What do I mean?

If we take the supernatural and outward facing gifts of the Holy Spirit, for example in 1 Corinthians 12. We see great outer facing gifts of the Spirit in action. But there are the quieter deep works of the Spirit within a person, that over time may develop in a more obvious but less flamboyant (but by no means less important) way. For example, the fruits of the Spirit in Galatians 5. This means that the number of bums on seats is a more limited,

and maybe superficial, measurement tool. At this I will say that it is again a useful but limited guide.

My reflection is that the growth in discipleship is harder to measure. Yes there should be outward signs or Spiritual Growth. Discipleship is something that we take very seriously as part of our ministerial responsibility. The problem with that is of course we (the ministry team) can only do so much. We can tend the soil, try to shelter and support, we can water and feed, in terms

of discipleship, by discerning themes and focuses for discipleship and church life. Backing this up with well-intended teaching and follow up material. Encouragement to pray, special seasonal focuses (lent for example) and supporting home-groups. The real work is done by the Holy Spirit, but everyone has a part to play in tending their own spiritual garden.

I love the diverse ways people in our congregation propagate their own soil. I know some who listen to lots of Christian music, others who read books and others who prayer walk or have taken to reading the Bible in a year. This shows that spiritual gardening is in some ways a 3-person job. The Holy Spirit, your ministry team and yourself. Although I stress again, not split equally. How we allow that to be split up and how we expect to grow are really questions for ourselves to reflect on. So, how does your garden grow? How is your soil?

Allow me to extend this garden metaphor a bit more:

What I love about churches is their variety, a garden full of the same plant may look ok at times when the plan is active. However, when you have plants of different sizes, shades, heights etc, then you have a good garden. I honestly believe that our diversity is our strength, our differences and fruitfulness can vary but planted together are special.

My friends, as we tend our gardens this summer. Let us not forget to tend the spiritual gardens of ourselves and the church, all part of God's glorious garden.

How can I make the most of the rest of my life?

What a question? Not something I ask myself daily. However, Rectory Farm Community Church have been following the Alpha course and for Session 11 the topic of the session was the above question.

The Alpha Guide goes through the following points in order to answer the question

- 1. What should we do?
- a. Break with the past
- b. Make a new start
- c. God has treasures in store for us

The Scripture verse that goes with the above is from Romans 12 v 2 I have taken the Message version Romans 12 v 1-2. Place your Life Before God

"So here's what I want you to do, God helping you: Take your everyday, ordinary life-your sleeping, eating, going to work, and walking around life - and place it before God as an offering. Embracing what God does for you is the best thing you can do for him. Don't become so well-adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking. Instead, fix your attention on God. You'll be changed from the inside out. Readily recognise what he wants from you and quickly respond to it. Unlike the culture around you, always dragging you down to its level of immaturity, God brings the best out of you, develops well-formed maturity in you"

Changed from the "inside out". For me God has changed me radically, over a long time, step by step. For some, people are changed immediately, remember Saul who was blinded in Acts 9, and then Jesus sent Anaias to place his hands on him to pray with him to be "filled with the Holy Spirit" Acts 9 v 17.

Not for me, God has changed me over time. A main change I have seen is, I used to be very angry at so many things and flare up, over nothing. Reading scripture, seeing how the Prophets of the Old Testament managed their emotions, and reading how Jesus would react to people around him, made me think and gradually I have learnt to manage my anger. That's not to say I still don't have my moments!!!!

- v. Ears

- b. "As living sacrifices"
- c. We will find freedom / There will be a cost / There will be challenges.

The word of God always challenges. I am a list person, I love a good list, tasks, prayers, to do's, events coming up. Where would I be without a list.

However, I do not have a list of becoming a "living sacrifice". That sounds scary, so I go back to the verse in Romans: "So, here's what I want you to do, God helping you: Take your everyday ordinary life-your sleeping, eating, going to work, and walking around life-and place it before God as an offering".

Give God your everyday life, your daily tasks for Him to use. We can reflect on the current teaching series on Prayer, as an example, by praying for people as a Privilege, as Confessing, as Powerful, as Colourful, being Persistent, God can use each and every one of us to make the most of the rest of our lives to be part of the Kingdom and to bring others into the Kingdom, as they see how we undertake our day to day activities. How amazing is that?

The final sections covered:

- 3. Why should we do it?
- a. What God has done for us
- i. In view of Gods mercy" Romans 12 v 1 (NIVUK)
- b. What God has planned for our future
- i. "His good, pleasing and perfect will" (Romans 12 v 2 NIVUK)

As part of the discussion at the end of the session, we shared testimonies about how Gods mercy, power, presence and might was shown to us through answered prayer, and how as a group we don't often share these stories. So, to finish I would like to ask you to share your testimonies with each other through BERT. To encourage each other, to tell each other how God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit has been present in your life when the outlook looked bleak, hopeless, lacking direction.

Even Easier Garter Stitch Poppies

This very simple pattern gives a lovely fluted edge poppy which is firm and not too large You will need:

3.75 needles or needles to achieve a nice tight finish

Quantity of red yarn

Button for centre.

BODY OF POPPY

Cast on 70 stitches
Knit 8 rows garter stitch
Rows 9 - 11 knit 2 tog across row
FINISHING

Cut yarn and thread through remaining stitches. Sew edges together to form a round. Sew button to centre.

Or if you want to be creative go right ahead!

SB – Emmanuel celebrated 50 years last year, what distinctive things about us have you seen in your time here? The thing I love most about Emmanuel is the passion and enthusiasm of the church family to embrace their diversity and work hard to draw everyone together. Attendance at C of E churches grows for the fourth year in a row

The overall number of regular worshippers across the Church of England's congregations grew to 1.02 million in 2024, a rise of 1.2 per cent, according to an early snapshot of the annual Statistics for Mission findings.

It was the second year in a row in which the Church of England's 'worshipping community' - the combined number of regular members of local congregations – has stood above a million since the Covid-19 pandemic.

The numbers in the pews on a typical Sunday was up by a further 1.5 per cent to 582,000 in 2024, extending rises over recent years.

And overall, the in-person attendance across the week edged upwards by 1.2 per cent in a year, and stood at just over 701,000 last year, according to the early figures.

The increase was driven by a recovery in attendance by adults (over 16), among whom average Sunday attendance was up by 1.8 per cent, and weekly attendance rose by 1.5 per cent.

While the overall figures show that in-person attendance has not fully reached pre-pandemic levels, the figures suggest it is moving closer to the pre-pandemic trend.

The preliminary snapshot of Statistics for Mission returns follows separate figures which show there has also been a sharp increase in traffic on the Church of England's church-finder website, AChurch-NearYou.com.

The number of page visits to AChurchNearYou.com jumped by 55 per cent last year to almost 200 million as people searched for their local congregation.

The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, said: "The Church of England exists to share the good news of Jesus Christ. So it is encouraging to see further signs that more people are coming to faith in Jesus Christ and having their lives changed.

"Although this is just a snapshot and we don't know the ages of those who have started attending church in the past year, other evidence suggests that many of these are young adults.

Debbie Clinton, the Church of England's Director for Vision and Strategy, said: "Our statistics are much more than numbers, each represents an individual. In 2024 we have heard and seen exciting stories of growth in parishes, in our estates and in post-industrial and coastal towns.


"Nationally we aim to ensure that each young person has a flourishing children, youth and families' ministry within reach of them, we are seeing growth in the number of churches with more than 25 young people attending."

In 2024 an estimated 7.43 billion smartphones were in use worldwide. This represents a significant increase from previous years. In the UK. 94% of people aged 16 and over own a smartphone, equating to around 51.8 million people.



A wake up call to the world

If you stop to ask anyone in the street about slavery they would probably tell you it was abolished hundreds of years ago. After all, in the UK the Abolition of the Slave Trade Act of 1807 made it illegal to trade in enslaved people across the British Empire and in 1833 the Abolition of Slavery Act ended the use of enslaved labour.

More than that, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights adopted in December 1948 states clearly that 'No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms'. Yet today it is estimated that there are 50 million people in slavery of one form or another around the world. It is happening in every country including the UK. All too often it is hidden in plain sight.

We may speak of victims and survivors, but these are not just victims and survivors, they are individuals. Each one of them has a personality and hopes and dreams which have been cruelly shattered by those who make a profit from them. The slave drivers and traffickers buy and sell people as commodities, whose only value is in the profit they generate.

Scooped up from towns and villages to satisfy the personal or commercial interests of the slave drivers their freedom is cruelly torn from them; they are deprived of their dignity, dehumanised and thrust into a life of misery.

Sadly vulnerability to modern slavery and human

trafficking is increasing. Climate change, conflict, migration, poverty lead to vulnerability to being taken into slavery and/or trafficked into exploitation.

This is a moral stain on our humanity. Modern slavery and human trafficking is the greatest human rights issue of our time. If we are going to end this degrading and inhumane activity, to give people back their freedom and the right to make choices over their own lives we need to act and we need to act now.

After I stepped down from No 10 I worked to establish the Global Commission on Modern Slavery and Human Trafficking which I Chair. On 8 April at the headquarters of the United Nations (UN) in New York we launched our report with recommendations to the UN, governments, businesses and civil society organisations. The report can be found on the Commission's website

This report is a wake-up call to the world. It challenges governments, businesses and civil society to recognise the prevalence of modern slavery and human trafficking and to understand their responsibility to act.

We can reduce the number of people in slavery around the world but to do so we must all play our part including the public. The report is a Call to Action to us all.
